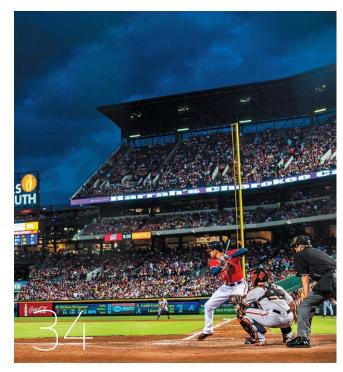

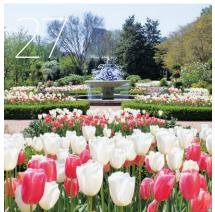

## Fashion's Free Spirit

Trendsetting designer Mara Hoffman reveals her best-kept secrets for shopping in New York City.

ara Hoffman makes clothes for the woman who wants to stand out. Unabashedly colorful, saturated in vibrant prints and often dripping in luxe embellishments (feathers, tassels and ostrich eggshells, anyone?), her gauzy gowns, oversized tunics and patterned swimsuits have become something of a uniform for a new generation of bohemian goddesses.

A native of Buffalo, N.Y., Hoffman earned her credentials at Parsons The New School For Design, joining the ranks of fellow alumni such as Tom Ford, Marc Jacobs and Alexander Wang. She launched her first ready-to-wear collection, Circle by Mara Hoffman, in 2000, and began designing exclusively under the Mara Hoffman name in 2005.

Originally hand-dyed, one-ofa-kind couture pieces, Hoffman's creations quickly progressed to revolve around silk prints that recall the rich landscapes and cultures of South America and the Pacific Islands. A hotly anticipated line of bikinis and coverups made its debut in 2008, followed in 2013 by a capsule collection of ethereal bridal gowns featuring intricate latticework and embroidery. Never one to slow down, Hoffman is currently in the process of rolling out a kids' swimwear collection, sold partially in conjunction with J. Crew's popular Crewcuts children's line.

Today, Hoffman splits her time between her showroom in Manhattan and her home in Brooklyn with her husband, acclaimed collage artist Javier Piñón, and their toddler son, Joaquin. A consummate shopper, Hoffman is fully versed in the city's must-stop shops and hidden finds. Here, she shares her recommendations for top-notch retail in the world's undisputed fashion capital.

Loews Magazine: Your work is such a bold departure from what most people consider the traditional New York aesthetic—dark, minimalist and understated. How does New York City influence your designs, if at all?

Mara Hoffman: Honestly, New York's aesthetic doesn't influence my designs that much. That being said, it's still my home, a place for my team, and shapes who we are as a brand, in a sense. It's also the best place to be in terms of accessibility for a design house; we are blocks away from both factories and patternmakers.

LM: What are your thoughts on shopping and the retail scene in New York as opposed to cities like Los Angeles and Miami?

MH: New York is awesome for shopping. It's a walking city, so you can hit a few neighborhoods with amazing shopping without taking a car or a subway.

LM: What's your favorite spot to shop for yourself in the city?

MH: I like to stick by my home, Williamsburg [in Brooklyn].

LM: Which stores or boutiques do you find yourself frequenting in the New York area?

MH: I frequent Love, Adorned in Nolita for beautiful home goods and jewelry, and Narnia in Williamsburg for really unique vintage pieces. ... Narnia is a bit tucked away in Williamsburg and under the radar, depending on who you talk to.

LM: What are three must-stop shops you'd recommend to someone

who might be visiting New York for the first time?

MH: Three great stores to check out if you haven't been to New York before would be Dover Street Market [in Midtown Manhattan], Barneys New York uptown and Love, Adorned.

MH: We actually just launched a kids' swim collection on our website as well as with Crewcuts by J. Crew. Right now it's only girls' swim pieces, but we would love to expand that to boys as well in the future. Otherwise, I love

LM: Which three New York stores would you stop by if you were shopping for your husband? MH: I would head to

[Manhattan-based clothing boutiques] Unis and Save Khaki, and Love, Adorned for my husband.

MH: We would hit the flea market in Williamsburg, then take the ferry to the carousel in Dumbo [also in Brooklyn], and finish it off with fish tacos at Rosarito Fish Shack. L

## Late-Night Bites

#### Here's where to find the best midnight snacks.

ooner or later, it happens: You're out late, time flies, and the next thing you know, you're starving. There's only one solution—find a late-night hot spot with seriously good eats served round the clock. Luckily for us, local gourmets in Loews cities are willing to dish on their favorite places for after-hours treats, from food trucks to hole-in-the-wall haunts and retro lounges.

"Top Chef" alumnus C.J. Jacobson of Girasol in Studio City, located just minutes from the Loews Hollywood Hotel, has a few recommendations for late-night dining. His favorite spot is Red Medicine on Wilshire Boulevard in Beverly Hills, a Vietnamese-themed joint venture from chef Jordan Kahn, Noah Ellis and Adam Fleischman (of Umami Burger fame). "I always get the French dip or the banh mi open-faced sandwich," Jacobson says.

The chef also cops to frequenting late-night taco trucks such as El Chato (open until 3 a.m. Fridays and Saturdays) on the corner of Olympic Boulevard and La Brea Avenue, where bite-sized \$1 tacos are a hit along with cheesy quesadillas and burritos laced with a supremely addictive smoky chipotle sauce. Nearby, legendary deli fare is available 24 hours a day at Canter's Deli on Fairfax Avenue, while vintage diner Du-par's offers classic burgers, sandwiches, pancakes and pies sure to

satisfy that late-night sweet tooth.

"I don't think anyone is thinking healthy when it comes to late-night dining," Jacobson adds. "It's more about indulging."

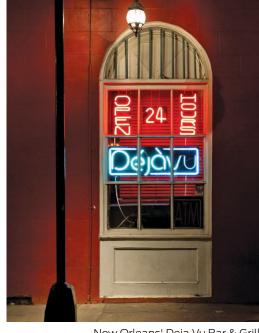
For even more indulgence, head to LA's trending downtown area, which has experienced a renaissance in culture, nightlife and, of course, food over the past few years. In-the-know foodies flock to the Pacific Dining Car, a refurbished coach that's been in operation as a restaurant since 1921, for top-notch steaks, brioche French toast and eggs Benedict.

On the opposite coast, perhaps no other city caters to hungry night owls as much as New York does. International restaurateur Richie Notar has been in the business since the days of Studio 54, when he was club co-owner Steve Rubell's right-hand man. After overseeing the spread of the

to open the hotly anticipated Harlow restaurant in Manhattan. Once Notar and Harlow chef Danny Ye call it a night, they often set out in search of a good bite and brews.

A few of Notar's post-midnight stops include Great N.Y. Noodletown on the Bowery for its menu of classic noodle bowls, Roti Boti in Queens for authentic Pakistani dishes like grilled lamb chops and chicken tikka with garlic naan, and Tacos El Bronco in Brooklyn for arguably the best tacos in New York. For Korean barbecue, he recommends the 24-hour New Wonjo Restaurant in Koreatown, known for serving up plates like scallion pancakes and short ribs.

Notar is eager to offer tips to those looking to explore a city's after-hours dining scene: "Look at magazines like BlackBook or food blogs like Eater and Grub Street. In my opinion, though, the best way is to ask the person that's waiting on you or the person making your drink. [They are your] best source for late-night dining and party spots."

Moving south of the Mason-Dixon Line brings just as many solid late-night options. In particular, beloved New Orleans food writer Lorin Gaudin carries a torch for late-night dining in the Big Easy. "The city stays alive virtually all the time with something incredible to see, sip, eat or experience," she says.

One of Gaudin's top picks is The Saint Bar & Lounge located in the Garden District, about 10 minutes from the French Quarter. She says the popular nightspot is "small and a bit grungy, but that's the charm. The cocktails are standout, especially on Tiki Tuesday." Don't even think about showing up before midnight—this is the kind of place that doesn't hit its stride until 2 a.m.

In the French Quarter, locals praise the 24-hour Deja Vu Bar & Grill for its omelets and chargrilled burgers. And in the nearby Central Business District, the gourmet pizzas at Pie, Pizza & Pastas draw late-night revelers jonesing for Italian classics.

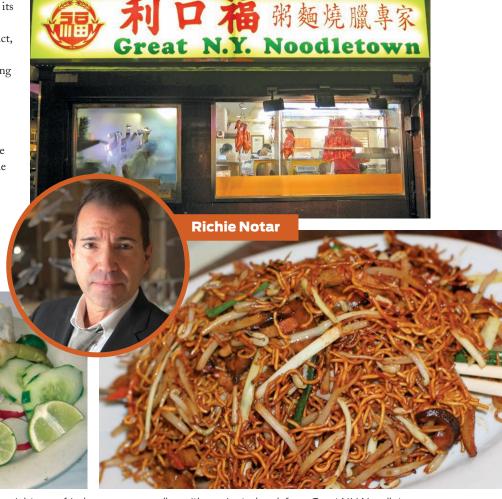
Head to one of the South's other culinary capitals, Nashville, for even more alternatives. Just a few miles from the Loews Vanderbilt Hotel, the 12South neighborhood is home to the inimitable M.L. Rose Craft Beer & Burgers. The home-style restaurant attracts new converts every day with hearty burgers, barbecue standards and gourmet waffle fries.

For a nontraditional take on

late-night entertainment, stop by Pinewood Social in hip East Nashville. The recently launched concept includes a full bar, lounge, restaurant, coffee station, event space and, coming soon, a swimming pool. Quell Southern

cravings with fried cheese curds or a pork belly salad with poached egg.

With so many temptations offered at all hours in Loews cities, staying out late never tasted so good—just plan on sticking around for breakfast, too. L

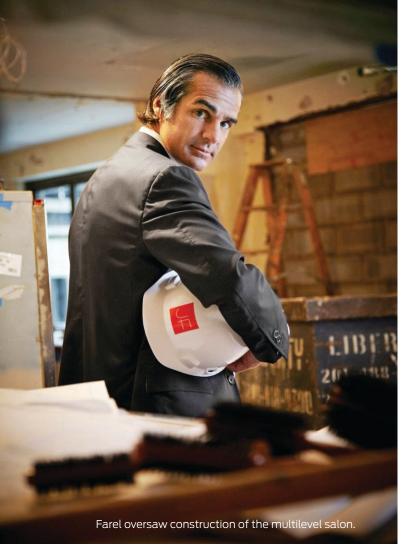

"[The hotel] being a fairly small property allows us to have personalized interactions with our guests," says concierge Olivier Leprince, who's worked at the hotel for four years. "Taking the time to understand their needs and interests allows us to better recommend Montreal's bests."

Eat: Montreal is a foodie's dream, and one of the restaurants at the top of Leprince's list is Europea for upscale French fare. In 2013, the restaurant was invited to join Grand Tables of the World, a 142-member culinary association that celebrates the best gourmet restaurants from 23 countries around the world. Sample Europea's innovative menus, which include dishes like lobster cream cappuccino with truffle puree and maple-infused foie gras.

"Another suggestion is Da Emma restaurant, a fine dining Italian establishment housed in the building of the first women's prison of Canada," Leprince says. Or, combine dinner with dancing at Buonanotte and Globe restaurants: "These two locations are well known as trendy supper clubs, where you can eat and then party the night away on Montreal's main boulevard." More spots for cutting a rug include Salsathèque for

Latin rhythms and Club Electric Avenue for 1980s and 1990s hits.

Shop: Retail mavens don't have to travel too far for upscale shopping. Just across the street from the Loews Hôtel Vogue is Ogilvy department store, which offers brands like Hugo Boss, Burberry, Lacoste, Louis Vuitton, Michael Kors and more. Meanwhile, Canadian luxury department store Holt Renfrew is just two blocks away and carries designer labels like Chanel, Dolce & Gabbana, Fabergé, Gucci, Hermès, Prada and Tiffany & Co.

you like music, sports, circuses, arts, dance or nature, you'll find something to meet your need."

If live music is what you're looking for, check out Les FrancoFolies de Montreal (June 13-21), an annual open-air festival that spotlights more than 1,000 French language performers, or the Montreal International Jazz Festival (June 26 – July 6), which is slated to feature performers ranging from Michael Bublé to Ben Harper to Buddy Guy.

Satisfy your need for speed during Formula 1's Grand Prix weekend (June 6-9) held at Gilles Villeneuve Circuit. Looking to let loose? The Just for Laughs festival (July 12-31) is an ode to all things comedy and attracts top performers like Amy Poehler, Eddie Izzard and Sarah Silverman.

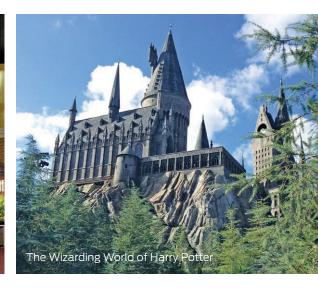
At the other end of the spectrum, Old Montreal should be a stop on everyone's list. Leprince recommends visiting the centuries-old Notre-Dame Basilica and witnessing the "And Then There Was Light" sound and light show, which uses modern technology to showcase the basilica's history, culture and architecture. Dating back to the early 1600s, this area of the city is one of the oldest urban areas in North America and is sure to take visitors on a fascinating trip back in time.

## Theme Park Thrills

#### **Loews Don CeSar Hotel**

Originally built in 1928, the Loews Don CeSar Hotel is a landmark property on the white sands of Florida's coast. The iconic hotel's prime location makes exploring the history of surrounding St. Petersburg a fun-filled adventure, and concierge Christina Spencer, a member of the prestigious Les Clefs d'Or USA (the U.S. branch of the international organization of professional hotel concierges), looks forward to leading you through a tour of this legendary resort and its host city.

"I'm a resident on the island and live on the beach just north of the hotel," she says. "I love this area and like to share information about it."

**Eat:** Fresh seafood is a staple in cities on the Gulf Coast, and St. Pete Beach is no exception. Spencer recommends the hotel's signature restaurant, the AAA Four Diamond Maritana Grille. "It offers the very best seafood in the area," she says. The restaurant, which was voted one of the top 10 seafood restaurants in the U.S. by Gayot, features a raw bar, seasonal fish prepared to the diner's preference and an extensive wine list.

One of the most popular seafood restaurants in St. Pete Beach is Snapper's Sea Grill, which offers a spread of surf and turf classics. Fifteen minutes away, seafood with a casual twist can be found at Walt'z Fish Shak, where the day's catch is written on a chalkboard menu.

**Shop:** You can find an everchanging selection of specialty items at Shoppes at the Don. According to Spencer, "They have gifts, jewelry, clothing for children, men and women, and an impressive bathing attire shop."

For boutiques and galleries with a local flavor, stop by St. Pete Beach's two historic districts, Corey Avenue and Eighth Avenue. "Two blocks south of the hotel is Nancy Markoe [Fine American Crafts] Gallery, which carries the works of 500 American artists and craftsmen," Spencer says. "Or, head to Gulfport for breakfast and stroll their eclectic shops. On Tuesdays, their outdoor market is in full swing with about 100 vendors selling produce, art, jewelry and prepared foods."

Play: Culture buffs should stop by St. Petersburg's museums, which cover everything from surrealism to contemporary crafts. "The Dalí [Museum] is most notable, but don't miss Chihuly [Collection at the Morean Arts Center], the Museum of Fine Arts and the St. Petersburg Museum of History," Spencer says.

For some fresh air, venture out to Fort De Soto Park, located just minutes from the hotel. "It houses acres of walking trails, picnic areas, a fishing pier, a dog beach and a play area," Spencer says. "You can rent a kayak or take a ferry out to Egmont Key to see the ruins of Fort Dade, the working lighthouse and the native gopher tortoises."

St. Petersburg is well known for its annual events like the Firestone Grand Prix (March 28-30), which features not only high-speed races, but also games, exhibits and multiple beer gardens. Beach Goes Pops (April 4-5) stages live concerts on the sand for a weekend of spectacular sounds, and the Mainsail Art Festival (April 19-20) showcases the work of more than 200 local artists along the waterfront. The diverse events, green spaces and attractions make the beach destination a coastal paradise.

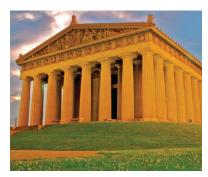
Kick up your heels in Nashville, the country music capital, for a dose of Southern flair.

For Southern hospitality with a country twang, a visit to Nashville, Tenn., should be on every traveler's bucket list. Music, history and great food characterize this town in the heart of Dixie. Born and raised in Nashville, VIP & Concierge Manager Emily Sledge has the inside scoop on everything you'll want to add to your itinerary.

"I've been around this building nearly my whole life," she says about the Loews Vanderbilt Hotel. "I really enjoy adding something special to every guest's stay here."

**Eat:** "We have so many fine restaurants," Sledge says. And that's an understatement: According to Bon Appétit magazine, Nashville even boasts the No. 3 new restaurant in the country, Rolf and Daughters, which is housed in a 100-year-old factory in Germantown and serves Mediterranean and Northern Italian dishes reimagined with a Southern twist.

Sledge recommends Mason's, the hotel's on-site Southern brasserie that's risen to prominence under the direction of award-winning chef Brandon Frohne. Husk restaurant in the heart of downtown also shouldn't be missed; the Southern-style eatery is a project of James Beard Award-winning chef Sean Brock, who takes pride in using local and artisanal ingredients.

For lighter fare like appetizers and salads, Sledge suggests the Bluebird Cafe, where country music stars like John Prine, LeAnn Rimes and Garth

Brooks have all performed acoustic sets in between bites of smoked pork sandwiches and other regional delicacies. Another local hot spot, Tootsie's Orchid Lounge, serves up hearty bar food with a side of continuous live music.

**Shop:** The Mall at Green Hills is Nashville's largest retail playground and features anchor stores like Nordstrom and Macy's as well as designer and specialty shops. For a retro-inspired experience, stop by Hillsboro Village, roughly a mile from the hotel and home to blocks of kitschy boutiques and cafes.

Looking for an authentic Southern accessory? Head no farther than Imogene + Willie for personalized denim or Lucchese for handmade boots. "Blue jeans and cowboy boots are things that people who come here want to go home with," Sledge says. "[At Lucchese] there are all kinds of top-of-the-line boots, and you can also meet with their designer and create custom cowboy boots."

**Play:** Nashville may be famous for its musical heritage, but the city also has a rich Civil War history. "Many people come here because they're history buffs," Sledge says. She suggests a trip to nearby Franklin to see the preserved battlefield where the Battle of Franklin was fought in 1864; the historic fight decimated the Army of Tennessee, leaving thousands dead on both sides of the political divide.

Another cultural highlight is the world's only full-scale reproduction of the Greek Parthenon located in Nashville's Centennial Park. "It's one of those things you have to see when you come to Nashville," Sledge says. "It houses our city's art museum."

Of course, Sledge and the Loews Vanderbilt Hotel remain faithful to the music that put the city on the map. One must-see is the Ryman Auditorium, a 2,362-seat venue that dates back to 1892 and originally hosted the Grand Ole Opry. In addition, Sledge says, "We always suggest that people go see the Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum, since we are, of course, the country music capital of the world." The museum houses thousands of artifacts and photographs from music history, including a gold Cadillac belonging to the King himself, Elvis Presley.

Gardens: With its distinctive Southwestern vistas, Tucson is home to flora that's completely unique to Arizona's

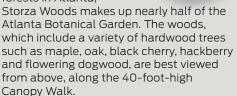
desert lands. At the Tucson Botanical Gardens, originally a private home, 17 themed gardens are scaled to residential size, providing an intimate experience. Gardens here feature a distinctive regional flair and include Aloe Alley, the Native American Crops Garden and specific areas for cacti and succulents.

Also in Tucson, Loews Ventana Canyon is surrounded by scenic desert landscapes that are particularly colorful in spring, when eager wildflowers burst onto the scene. Garden features 20 themed gardens and more than 22,000 plant species. The adjacent Biodome gives guests glimpses of multiple North American ecosystems, such as a northern maple forest, the cold estuary waters of the Gulf of St. Lawrence and the subarctic climate of the Labrador coast.

Inside the botanical garden, the First Nations Garden provides guided tours and is home to more than 300 different plant species and 5,000 trees, shrubs and grasses. Inspired by Native American and Inuit cultures, the garden showcases activities related to the plant world, including gathering food and medicinal plants. (espacepourlavie.ca/en/botanical-garden)

While in Coronado, head to Silver Strand State Beach, which showcases a variety of local plant life as well as sand dollars, snowy plovers and California's famed grunion fish. Every Sunday, guests of nearby Loews Coronado Bay can enjoy complimentary guide-led nature walks to learn about the habitats of the coastal area and the many creatures who call them home. #### **New Orleans**

# VIVAItalia

Agile, compact and environmentally friendly, the Fiat 500 continues to excite and please modern drivers nearly 60 years after the original model turned heads in Italy.

ne of the first players in the automobile industry, Fiat has expertly navigated a winding road. From the founding of the company in 1899 to the recent unveiling of its award-winning 500 model, Fiat has grown to become synonymous with modern, sleek, Italian design. With exciting new cars and innovative technology, the company has solidified its role as a premier example of European styling.

Fiat had been making vehicles for more than 50 years when the Nuova 500 (the first model in the 500 series) was released in 1957. This model launched the brand back into prominence after a hiatus during World War II, and set the course for a string of advancements and improvements including increased space and better gas mileage. Its compact design helped drivers navigate the narrow Italian streets with ease, but unlike the scooter—the most popular mode of transportation

at the time—it also left room for storage.

Several subsequent models—the 500 Sport, 500D and 500F—cemented the Fiat 500's success and reflected the brand's evolution over the next decade. In 1968 the 500L, or Lusso, was released. Aimed at a luxury market, the Lusso revealed updates like chrome detailing, quilted leather seats and improved fuel economy, and was sold at a higher price point.

Viewed as the proverbial swan song of the series, only one other 500 model



was released after the Lusso, the 500R. Almost 3.9 million examples of the historic 500 model were built before the car was taken off the market in 1975.

Fifty years after Fiat first introduced the 500, the release of the new Fiat 500 in 2007 marked a new era for the brand. Fresh, sporty, luxurious and a bit nostalgic, the new 500 was an immediate hit when it entered European markets that year. In an age of environmentally conscious vehicles, Fiat combined iconic Italian style with speed, agility and higher gas mileage, something that popular hybrid models hadn't yet achieved.

Three years later, in 2010, the Fiat 500 launched the return of the brand in North America and became an international sensation. The Fiat Cinquecento (500) Prima Edizione epitomized classic Italian design and featured modern safety and quality standards, seamlessly blending old and new. The editions that followed have maintained this vision while expanding options to appeal to drivers' needs. The 500L has also made its return, still providing Italian refinement and increased functionality. With four doors and seating for five, the model has remained true to its roots without sacrificing a key aspect—being fun to drive.

Always evolving, Fiat will undoubtedly continue to make groundbreaking advancements in technology and design to the delight of auto fans. And, this time around, the 500 is here to stay. L

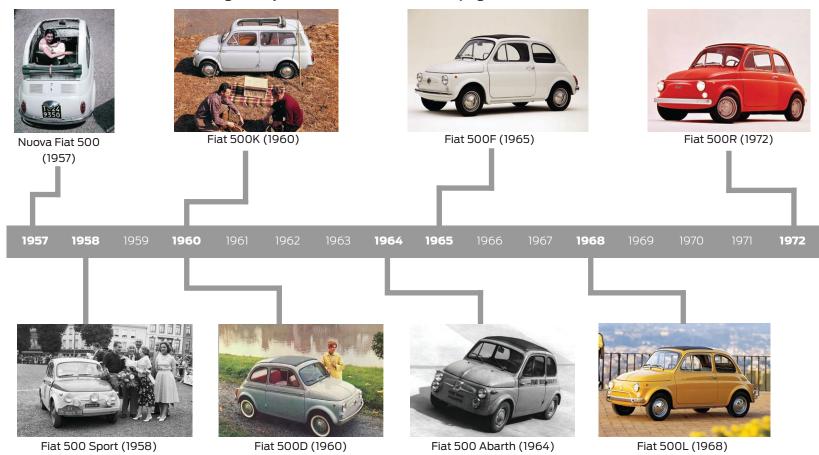

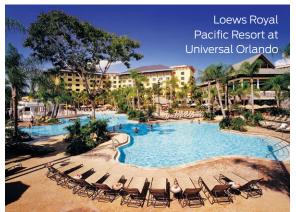

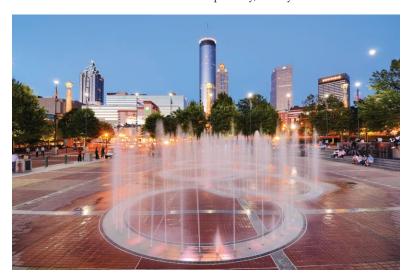
# ATLANTA: HOME of the BRAVE

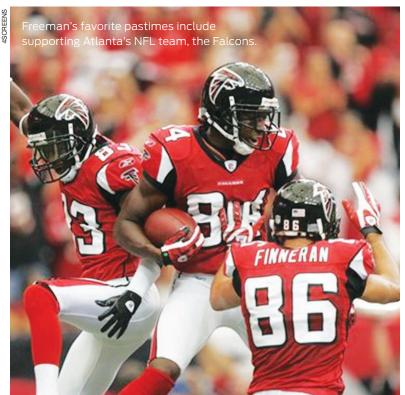
From March through October, Freeman is all about work and very little play—except for baseball, of course. "During the season, I'm pretty lame," he jokes. On game days, he sleeps in as late as

possible before heading to Turner Field around 1:30 p.m. for an evening game.

He eats the same thing every day for lunch: a bison burger prepared by the team's chef. "It's really not out of superstition; I just like it," he explains. Then he sets out for batting practice and gets warmed up for the game. After playing hard and hopefully winning, Freeman heads back to the clubhouse to shower and relax. "We have a media room and several of us will eat, hang out and wind down a bit."

When Freeman gets home—usually late—he relaxes with some TV. "With the adrenaline still pumping after the game, it's really hard to go to sleep," he says. But he does eventually get some shut-eye, and then it's time to get up and do it all over again.

During the off-season, Freeman focuses on staying sharp for the game. One reason he chose to live in the area year-round is so that he could work out with his teammates, and he usually meets up with Dan Uggla,

#### **Out and About**

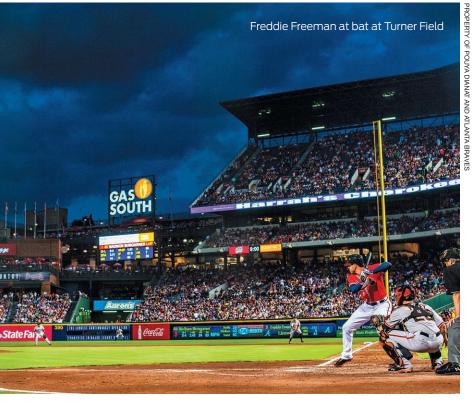
In the rare moments that Freeman doesn't have baseball on the brain, he likes to travel to Buckhead for a little shopping and dining. He lived in Buckhead when he first moved to Atlanta, so the neighborhood feels like home. With two major malls across the street from each other—Lenox Square and Phipps Plaza—Buckhead is a retail hot spot with shopping and dining options to suit every budget. "We love to make a day of it," he says. "We'll shop, have lunch at Twist, do some more shopping, and then have a nice dinner at Bone's." Conveniently located at Phipps Plaza, Twist's contemporary and casual atmosphere is a local favorite for tapas and sushi. Bone's Restaurant is just 1 mile down Peachtree Street off of Piedmont Road; the oldfashioned, fine dining steakhouse has been around since 1979 and is considered one of the country's best.

Back at Phipps Plaza, Freeman and his fiancee check out department stores like Nordstrom and Saks Fifth Avenue. While at Lenox Square, the Californian in Freeman has a hard time passing up the Vans footwear outpost, and the athlete in him can't resist checking into the sporting goods shops like Champs Sports for some gear from one of his sponsors, Under Armour.

When Freeman has family and friends visiting from out of town, he likes to show off downtown Atlanta.

His favorite activities involve sports, naturally—whether it's cheering on the Atlanta Falcons at the Georgia Dome or catching the Hawks as they run the court at Philips Arena. In the realm of non-sports activities, he also likes to stroll around Centennial Olympic Park, where he and his family and friends can take in views of downtown, including landmarks like the CNN Center and Georgia World Congress Center. Freeman explains that he enjoys trips to the Georgia Aquarium, located just north of the park, for its fascinating collection of marine life. Also nearby is the World of Coca-Cola, which he visits on occasion. "Coca-Cola is just one of those Atlanta icons," he says. "[The World of Coca-Cola] is just one of those places you can go to multiple times and still enjoy."





#### A Brave New Season

In the spring, Freeman's attention is fully trained on helping to bring another winning baseball season to Atlanta. "This season is going to be different with some of our veterans [Brian McCann and Tim Hudson] gone, but I'm excited," he says. "We have a really young team and we are

#### Out to the Ballgame

While in Atlanta, catch Freddie Freeman and the rest of the Braves in action downtown at Turner Field (atlantabraves.com). There's plenty to do inside the venue in addition to catching a game: The Ivan Allen Jr. Braves Museum & Hall of Fame is open daily, even during the off-season and when the Braves are out of town, and guided tours of the stadium are also available with advance reservations.

Turner Field also hosts some of baseball's best bites on game days. Get in line early at H&F Burger, popularized by renowned Atlanta chef Linton Hopkins. The eatery's signature Holeman & Finch burger was once only available after 10 p.m. (officially called "burger time") at Hopkins' Holeman & Finch Public House. Now you can get your hands on one of the legendary two-patty burgers any day the Braves are playing a home game. Hungry spectators can also opt for one of chef Kevin Rathbun's decadent steak sandwiches at Kevin Rathbun Steak in section 205, or stop by the Waffle House, a ritual for many a superstitious Braves fan—not only are the breakfast items tasty, but the Braves went on a 14-game winning streak in the 2013 season that started the day the Turner Field Waffle House opened, making fans believe the sacred syrup spot is a lucky charm.

all maturing and growing together. There's a great chemistry in the clubhouse, and I think it's going to be a really good season."

The 2014 season also marks the beginning of the Atlanta Braves' last three years at Turner Field. Last fall, team officials made a surprising announcement that the team would be relocating to a brand new stadium just northwest of the city for the 2017 season. Freeman, like many of the Braves' fans, sees the move as bittersweet. "There are so many memories here at Turner Field," he reflects. He's excited,

however, at the prospect of a new stadium tailor-made for the Braves. The new open-air facility will also be surrounded by an entertainment complex. "We just want to make the most of these last three years at Turner Field and bring a champion-ship home to Atlanta."

Even with the roster changes and big move, Freeman still has many years with the Braves ahead of him and a promising career that may one day lead him to the National Baseball Hall of Fame. For now, though, he's content with enjoying all that Atlanta has to offer. L

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# Sampling the STREETS

Hit the road and experience a true taste of local culture through the country's flourishing street food scene.

here was once a time when the term "street food" conjured up images of vendors hawking quick, simple snacks to hungry folks who were in a rush to grab a cheap bite. More than just hot dogs and pretzels, the street food scene is now made up of some serious chefs serving savory and sweet creations that are highly sought-after by food fans and fellow chefs alike.

Sold out of fully equipped trucks and portable stands, the best street food is often the hardest to track down. You can scour food blogs or beg your friends to give you the scoop-or you can read on for some of the nation's top picks of the best eats sold on the streets.

#### **Big Apple Bites**

The City that Never Sleeps has been fueled by food served off of carts since its beginnings. Like in many other cities, the relationship between street vendors and the law hasn't always been harmonious but, in more recent history, New York's street food culture has been praised for being delicious, innovative and as eclectic as its residents.

Among the seemingly endless businesses whose specialty is good food served right on the street, the bright yellow shirts of The Halal Guys at 53rd and Sixth have become legendary, attracting long lines and spawning many imitators. The guys capitalize on a city specialty—rice platters served with halal meat, whether it's chicken, beef or lamb.

But New York's street food scene extends far beyond one intersection. "There's so many," says Keith Klein, owner of the Milk Truck, of New York's street food options. "You can't go wrong getting a falafel at Taïm (a falafel and smoothie truck) or a waffle at Wafels & Dinges (a popular Belgian food truck). I like the food at the Calexico food cart." Calexico's three carts (in the Flatiron District, Soho and Brooklyn Bridge Park) serve what the owners deem "Mexican food cooked by a bunch of gringos from California," but the food has earned rave reviews and even the highest honor from the "Oscars of street food," the Vendy Awards, in New York City in 2008, just two years after launching.

And of course, there's the Milk Truck, a local favorite that can be found rolling around the city hawking a simple American classic: the grilled cheese sandwich. Klein says the most popular items are the classic (aged Wisconsin Gruyere and cultured butter on Balthazar Bakery's Pullman bread), the bacon cheddar blue (double-smoked bacon, New York cheddar, Wisconsin blue cheese, caramelized onions and spicy pickles on rosemary Pullman bread) and the milkshakes, which are made with customblended, small-batch ice cream.

"People don't view it as street food," Klein says of the street revolution. "It's

great food that just happens to come out of a mobile kitchen. We have a long tradition of feeding people on the street and the truck scene has expanded that to a wide range of great food from cultures as diverse as New York City."

#### **Beantown Cuisine**

Street food is so much a part of Boston's culture that there's even a Boston food truck schedule and locator on the city's website. As you might discover after scanning the list of vendors, the food isn't limited to one type, but seafood continues to reign supreme in this harbor city.

As a family-owned and family-operated business for four generations, Captain Marden's Seafoods is one of the largest wholesalers in New England, delivering fresh seafood to approximately 400 restaurants and businesses. Their truck, lovingly referred to as the

Cod Squad, is extremely renowned in the region.

"I often wonder—do people realize that the haddock sandwich they love so much is caught, filleted and on their plate within just hours?" says Terri Klippert Beal, the company's business director. "I do know one thing: When people dine from the Cod Squad, they often call, email, tweet, [post to] Facebook or come back to the truck and tell us, 'That was the best lobster roll, fish and chips, haddock sandwich, clam chowder, scallop plate ... I have ever had! What do you guys do to make it so good?' My answer? 'It's fresh!'"

The team members aboard the Cod Squad truck are the purveyors of the seafood, so their lobster rolls use the freshest lobster salad possible, made each morning. "We have the lobster tanks adjacent to our commissary," Beal explains. "We also use

only claw and knuckle meat—which is more tender and very sweet (not chewy)—making the lobster roll even more delectable."

Diners looking to try something other than seafood are in luck when in Boston: Bon Me is an Asian food truck run by husband and wife duo Patrick Lynch and Ali Fong. Founded in 2010, the truck is the result of the couple's decision to enter the Boston Food Truck Challenge on whim. They ended up winning.

Now, the couple has three colorful food trucks and one restaurant in Cambridge, Mass., serving bold, fresh and fun Vietnamese cuisine in the form of sandwiches, rice bowls, noodle salads and house-made drinks and desserts.

"Lunch lines are long," says Jennifer Ngo, Bon Me's marketing specialist. "But Bon Me prides itself on serving a tasty, healthy lunch as quickly as possible to help their busy customers get back to their busy lives, with orders being completed within minutes of being placed."

According to Ngo, the most popular option for a Bon Me first-timer is the sandwich stuffed with Chinese barbecue pork. Pair it with a refreshing Thai basil limeade, and lunch comes in at an affordable \$9.

#### **More Than Peaches**

Atlanta's street food industry is booming. Thanks to collective lobbying by food truck owners and their supporters, the city has loosened restrictions that prevented trucks from selling their goods and truck numbers have grown exponentially since they first appeared on Atlanta streets in 2009.

Along with quantitative growth, the scene is also showing signs of maturity through new, more sophisticated dishes. "The food is becoming more and more gourmet as traditional restaurateurs have discovered that it is often more cost-effective to have a truck than a building that just sits there waiting for customers," says Charlotte Swafford, the resident baker aboard the Southern Komfort (SoKo) Food truck.

Swafford also notes that, in the beginning, local restaurant owners lobbied hard for street vendors to be licensed out of their area for fear that it would ruin their business. Now, those restaurant owners have discovered that the trucks bring business

to the area as a whole, and the brickand-mortar bars and restaurants often see additional business from the food truck overflow.

The SoKo Food truck churns out down-home dishes with a healthy twist: The truck uses an air fryer to get that traditional crunch you'd expect in fries and chips, but nothing is fried in oil. The Texas brisket and traditional barbecue pulled pork are both standouts, but the truck is also known for its side dishes. "People say our spicy mac and cheese is downright addicting, and our new fried mac and cheese bites are fun and really in demand," Swafford says. "People in the area drive long distances for our chicken salad. We make it fresh every day, and everyone loves it because it is filled with big chunks of white meat, it's gluten-free and it isn't drowning in mayonnaise like some salads are."

The SoKo Food truck is just one of the vendors that make up the Atlanta Street Food Coalition, an organization started by the owner of

ice cream and sorbet truck Westside Creamery, Greg Smith. The coalition continues to support the street food movement in the city by campaigning for safe, affordable and legal access to street food through mobilizing street vendors, lobbying, fostering positive relationships with brick-and-mortar businesses and creating awareness of street vendors' widespread positive economic impacts.

#### **LA Street Fare**

Los Angeles residents are no strangers to street food. Similarly to New York, the city has had its fair share of differences with street vendors. Fortunately for foodies, LA was one of the earliest counties in the country to embrace food trucks and is currently looking at ways to legalize other forms of street vending. Chef Roy Choi introduced the Kogi BBQ truck in 2008, garnering national attention and helping to pave the way for a slew of trucks selling all varieties of food. Now, the LA street food scene has gained so much traction that it has a well-established festival, LA Street Food Fest, which takes place this year on June 28 at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif.

"The popularity of Roy Choi's Kogi truck put a spotlight on LA's street food, and it really exploded from there," says Shawna Dawson, who co-founded the festival with fellow Angeleno Sonja Rasula. Dawson explains that they started the festival in order to create a community

platform to support independent small business owners as well as local charities. The event hosts a variety of mandatory meetings for vendors that cover topics like marketing techniques and sustainable business models. Dawson says, "For us, every event is an opportunity to do a little good and make this amazing city we call home a little better."

A couple of the most popular vendors at the festival are the Grilled Cheese Truck, famous for its cheesy mac and rib made with sharp cheddar, barbecued pork and caramelized onions; and the Beignet Truck, which serves the classic French pastry along with fresh coffee or hot chocolate. Dawson's personal picks for LA street food include repeat LA Street Food Fest award winner Mariscos Jalisco, a truck that can be found regularly on Olympic Boulevard serving fresh shrimp tacos. For those with a sweet tooth, she recommends the Fluff Ice truck. "Their rose milk tea fluff topped with lychee jelly is refreshing and unique, and so light there's still room for more dessert when you're done," she explains.

Dawson adds, "From the thousands of 'loncheras' (the Spanish word for 'lunchbox,' the term is also used to describe food trucks) operating here for decades to the little taco tables that disappear as quickly as they come on the scene, to the myriad new school trucks you can follow online, there's a little something for everyone."

#### **Book It**

Loews Regency Hotel makes it easy to experience street cuisine while enjoying the benefits of midtown Manhattan. Food aficionados can hit the pavement to track down street favorites and wake up early for a Power Breakfast in The Regency Bar & Grill.

Set in the Back Bay neighborhood near Copley Square, which is frequented by trucks like Bon Me, the **Loews Boston** Hotel is ideal for those on the hunt for the city's best bites. The hotel's recently opened Precinct Kitchen & Bar offers guests a comfortable seat for when they need a break from the streets.

Loews Atlanta Hotel's mix of contemporary style and classic luxury make it a top choice for travelers to the city. On July 12, food trucks will descend on Piedmont Park, a short walk from the hotel, for the Atlanta Street Food Festival.

The streets of LA are crawling with vendors, and Loews has two hotels that are perfectly situated for culinary adventures. Guests of the Loews Santa Monica Beach Hotel can walk to the Santa Monica Food Truck Lot at the corner of Main Street and Ocean Park Boulevard on Tuesdays from 5-9:30 p.m. for a rotating list of vendors. ust a little bit off the top? Step into a barbershop today and you won't get your grandpa's haircut but, thankfully, that doesn't mean tradition has to fall by the wayside. The barbershop remains a place where guys can gather and get polished; some shops have even kept that classic red, white and blue pole spinning out front. But now there's more style in these familiar institutions than ever before—and we're not just talking about the hair. Today's barbershops have evolved into refuges that can include a cocktail or two along with a straight razor shave. Cities across the country are embracing the barbershop's comeback with the introduction of shops that blend modern amenities and decor with traditional service and, of course, lively banter.

With the rise of the modern man—who understands the importance of a tailored suit and isn't afraid of a little pampering here and there—guys are stepping up their game and returning to long-held customs in menswear and grooming. Along with word of mouth, social media has played a vital role in the upswing of the contemporary barbershop. Instagram and Facebook are both flush with images of fresh fades, classic cuts and guys getting cleaned up with straight razor shaves. It's a new way for an old institution to attract a younger customer base.

"Barbers have always been around," says Faraj Capistrano, master barber and owner of Capistrano Barbershop in Annapolis, Md. "We didn't realize they had disappeared. Most of our customers leave saying, 'We didn't know something like this existed.' Word of mouth has sparked the barbershop's revival."

#### **Classic Cuts**

Located in a city steeped in history, Capistrano Barbershop embraces oldschool aesthetics while implementing modern flair. A welcome escape from the bustle of Annapolis' historic Maryland Avenue, the shop is a coveted destination for men seeking traditional razor shaves and haircuts, not to mention a study in the current barbershop trend. You'll find no TVs here—instead, conversation is encouraged and there's plenty to go around in the small space with only four chairs. The business has always been a place where men are able to kick back and be themselves.

"If you are scruffy and come in for the hot towel straight-edge shave, that is 20 minutes of meditation," Capistrano says. "And if you just need a cleanup and a moment to forget what's out the door, we take care of the grooming and you can just relax."

In addition to its basic menu, Capistrano Barbershop is known for its groomsmen package, which allows a groom and his entourage to unwind with refreshments on the day of the wedding, engage in some guy talk and, of course, come out with a clean shave and a fresh cut.

Now an institution on both sides of the country, the Blind Barber has found a different way to get guys to loosen up while they're spending time in the chair. The shop, which has locations on both coasts (in New York and Los Angeles) offers cuts, shaves and a little something extra: a signature cocktail with every service.

"We take great pride in making our space feel like home, like a hangout," says co-owner Jeff Laub. "And if everyone feels like it's their own home, then it just makes the spot and experience that much more natural and organic."

The barbershop is just one aspect of the Blind Barber. Behind a hidden door, there's a lounge that serves up one-of-a-kind cocktails and offers a place for guys (and girls) to hang out after a cut. Men may flock to both locations for cuts and shaves during the day, but as soon as the sun goes down, groups of both men and women sneak off to the speakeasy-style back room. Services extend off-site too, because the Blind Barber team is often called upon to groom gentlemen at events for brands like J. Crew and labels participating in New York Fashion Weektestaments to the high standards to which the shop holds itself.

Adding to the experience, the Blind Barber also helps men stay groomed in between visits by offering a line of essentials such as hair wax, aftershave and facial cleanser, which are available online as well as in the store.

Whether visiting for a simple cleanup, to revel in rooms bedecked with mahogany and leather, or just enjoy some friendly male chatter, guys are flocking to a new wave of barbershops offering the same brand of personalized service that's made them timeless establishments of masculinity. 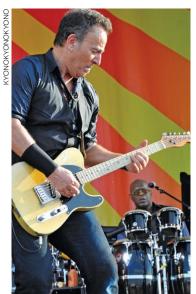

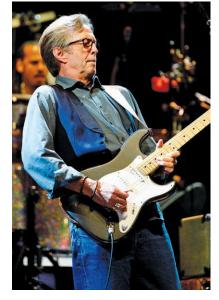

he syncopated rhythm of the drums, the wail of the horns, the smell of some good Creole cooking and the buzz of a happy crowd are all hints that Jazz Fest is, once again, in session. Established to preserve and celebrate the culture of New Orleans and Louisiana, the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival presented by Shell, lovingly referred to as simply "Jazz Fest," has now become an inseparable cornerstone of the city itself. Scheduled to take place this year over the weekends of April 25-27 and May 1-4, the festival will energize the Big Easy as hundreds of thousands of visitors and locals join to honor all that makes New Orleans a unique and important piece of jazz culture.

Each year, Jazz Fest packs hundreds of local, national and international musicians into its seven-day lineup spanning a wide range of genres beyond the realm of jazz-among them gospel, blues, rock, Caribbean and many more. The event brings

in internationally renowned artists like Bob Dylan, Miles Davis, Aretha Franklin, Al Green, Paul Simon, Sonny Rollins, Van Morrison, Dizzy Gillespie and Santana, to name a few.

#### **Spirit of the Fest**

After founding the Newport Jazz Festival in Rhode Island, the first annual jazz festival in America, in 1954, jazz promoter and producer George Wein was approached by tourism and business leaders to do

the same for the multicultural melting pot of New Orleans. In 1970, the city was introduced to the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival and Louisiana Heritage Fair, which took place in Congo Square (then called Beauregard Square). The humble festivities featured a few dozen acts, including Pete Fountain, Fats Domino, The Meters, the Olympia Brass Band and Mardi Gras Indians, and hosted about 350 people.

The spirit of Jazz Fest took hold at the inaugural event, specifically when, by chance, legendary gospel singer Mahalia Jackson met up with the Eureka Brass Band, who happened to be leading a parade of celebrants. After Wein handed her a mic, Jackson spontaneously began singing with the band and joined the parade herself.









As it grew, the event moved to its current location at the Fair Grounds Race Course in 1972 and soon shortened its name to its current form. The popularity of Jazz Fest spread quickly, and the event eventually became a two-weekend institution with music across 12 stages and endless food and craft offerings. The

festival now draws about 400,000 people each year, while retaining the



city's most cherished attractions.

New Orleans remains engrained in the festival's DNA, as many of the event's impressive performers have called the city home. Over the last half-century, jazz deities from the city like Professor



Beyond the music, dishes like crawfish bread and po'boys entice attendees.

Longhair, The Neville Brothers, Dr. John, Ellis Marsalis and Irma Thomas have graced the festival's stage, and continue to return year after year.

Consequently, the event has hosted some of music's most unforgettable moments. In 2006, the Jazz Fest immediately following Hurricane Katrina featured headliner Bruce Springsteen, who performed a momentous set complete with many words and adjusted lyrics that conveyed love, support and hope for the people of New Orleans. In 2012, he revisited many of those songs and sentiments, a captivating experience that explored just how far the city had come since his last time on the same stage. Springsteen is scheduled to play again this year, giving music lovers even more incentive to get to the fest.

Up-and-coming musicians also get

their time in the limelight at Jazz Fest, many in awe of the chance to perform in the same storied venue of jazz's biggest icons. The occasion gives audiences the opportunity to catch some talented rising stars, such as jazz singer Sasha Masakowski, who remembers a defining moment of her career and life as a jazz musician at the 2009 Jazz Fest. "I always saw the greatest of the great musicians perform in the Jazz Tent—all of these great musicians that I was inspired by and listened to all the time," she says. "And then when I performed on that stage, it was a really surreal moment for me."

Jazz clarinetist Tom Sancton was able to perform an homage to one of his musical heroes at the 1999 Jazz Fest, with the event itself acting as a paean to the musicians that came before: "I played a tribute to George Lewis, who was my great inspiration, teacher and idol as a clarinetist, with Sammy Rimington, who gave me my first clarinet, and Michael White, a good friend of mine and important figure in the jazz scene."

This year's 45th anniversary lineup hopes to create more of these memories for all who perform and attend the event. In addition to Springstreen, a host of longtime local acts as well as some big name headliners are scheduled to appear. Among the performers are Eric Clapton, Christina Aguilera, Arcade Fire, Santana, Gregory Porter, Robin Thicke, Trey Songz, Vampire Weekend, Foster the People, Alabama Shakes and Solange, just to name a few.

Hop on the St. Charles Avenue streetcar and head uptown to admire the brilliant mansions and antebellum architecture that line the avenue through the Garden District and toward Audubon Park, where you'll find Audubon Zoo. And for those seeking premier shopping and dining experiences, visit Magazine Street for a wide array of shops and restaurants to suit any and all tastes.



through the Fair Grounds Race Course.

"It's not just Jazz Fest, it's the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival," says Ron Kottemann, purveyor of Roman Chewing Candy, a local delicacy found each year at Jazz Fest. "Food is a tremendous part of the culture of Louisiana."

Wein's intention from the festival's original conception was to make the food just as important as the tunes. A testament to the festival's dedication to promoting local fare, two stagesthe Cajun Cabin and Food Heritage stages-are set up each year for cooking demonstrations that feature some of the area's top chefs. The food vendors serve up just about any local dish you can think of-everything from soft-shell crab po'boys and Crawfish Monica to jambalaya, red beans and rice, and a longtime Jazz Fest tradition: crawfish bread. The Southern specialty incorporates a mouthwatering mixture of crawfish, butter, cheese, garlic and green onions spread atop French bread and toasted for a moist and crispy piece of indulgence. African, Jamaican, Vietnamese and other international cuisines round out the melting pot of food contributions the city and state have to offer on the festival grounds.

#### **Getting Crafty**

Also a focus of Jazz Fest since its inception, arts and crafts aid in showcasing the area's rich history and culture. The festival offers three different areas for artisanal wares: Heritage Square for contemporary crafts, the Congo Square African Marketplace and the Louisiana Marketplace, displaying crafts that represent Louisiana's architecture, music and culture. Hundreds of artists set up shop where people can observe them at work and take home a

piece of the region if they please.

The festival also sets aside large areas devoted to the various cultures that make up Louisiana, ensuring visitors and locals an educational and enriching experience in addition to the fun. The Louisiana Folklife Village takes attendees on a journey through time with musicians, artists, craftsmen and cooks practicing both old and emerging traditions. In addition, the Grandstand is where visitors will find both food stages, as well as other cultural exhibits in an air-conditioned space.

#### **Local Pride**

Jazz Fest brings about 400,000 attendees and an excess of \$300 million to the city each year, so the event obviously has a large influence on New Orleans, both monetarily and emotionally. The influx of Jazz Fest visitors also enjoy the city's restaurants, visit local clubs and seek out countless other attractions.

"The economic impact of Jazz Fest keeps us alive the rest of the year," says Michael Fouquier, drummer of local funktronica band Gravity A. "Venues have bills that pile up yearround knowing that everything will be all right once Jazz Fest rolls around. Some musicians are the same way."

But the impact is more than just dollars and cents. "Keep in mind, we are now living in a post-Katrina era in New Orleans," explains festival producer Quint Davis. "So the role [of] and feeling toward the festival is more acute and defining than ever, especially for the local folks who get to come together each year to recharge their batteries and refresh their souls, powered by their own music and food."



When hundreds of thousands of people congregate to celebrate a rich and beloved heritage like that of New Orleans, they can expect to rejoice in the city and enjoy its sights, tastes and sounds—and that, in itself, is the purpose and essence of the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival. From music and food to craftwork and history, Jazz Fest is one big party that you don't want to miss.

The number of artists at Jazz Fest has grown from just a handful to hundreds.

While service is its main focus and finest achievement, the **Loews New Orleans Hotel** offers much more in terms of both amenities and special local flourishes.

# THE PEOPLE'S Designer

Though he may not be a household name, Stan Herman's widespread influence over the world of fashion extends from Bryant Park runways and home shopping to hotels and airlines.

ust beyond the two regal stone lions that guard the New York Public Library is Bryant Park, once the epicenter of the American fashion world. For many years the industry's biggest players gathered here, in the place New York Fashion Week called home for invitation-only unveilings of the latest international collections.

To this day, above the tiny park among the concrete and steel of midtown Manhattan, you'll find the atelier of one of the reigning monarchs of fashion: Stan Herman.

Unlike the names of, say, Karl Lagerfeld, Calvin Klein or Diane von Furstenberg, his name may not be instantly recognizable to the general public; still, most people are familiar with his work, and the fashion cognoscenti regard him as royalty.

For 16 years he was president of the Council of Fashion Designers of America (CFDA), a position later assumed by von Furstenberg. He's the founding president of event management company Seventh on Sixth, the original producer of New York Fashion Week (under the auspices of the CFDA), and a pioneer of the home shopping industry. In addition, he's dressed countless employees of some of the world's most recognizable companies with his stylish uniforms.

#### **Broadway to Runway**

Herman was born in a small town in a working-class part of south Bergen County, N.J. "I got out of there as quickly as I could," he recalls. "Nothing against New Jersey. My father lived there until he was 105 and had a great, great life."

After serving in the Army during the Korean War, he returned to the U.S., this time settling in New York to pursue show business. He sang, danced and acted on Broadway by night, and designed part-time for a company called Junior Forum on Seventh Avenue by day. When his collection launched, Women's Wear Daily declared it an unqualified success, resulting in his quitting Broadway to pursue a serious career in fashion.

The risk proved worthwhile—he became a ready-to-wear designer on Seventh Avenue at a company called







Mr. Mort, which sold moderately priced women's clothing. Herman remembers Mortimer Goldman, the original owner after whom the label was named, as "what we called a 'great garmento,' kind of a silver-suited salesman. ... [But] within a year, he lost the business."

After rejecting offers to design at companies like the now-obsolete label Nardis of Dallas, Herman was able to take over the Mr. Mort name under the ownership of an apparel maker called Russ Togs. He oversaw Mr. Mort's transition throughout the 1960s as its lead designer, transforming the label's image with high-quality, innovative collections. Between 1969 and 1974, Herman won three prestigious Coty American Fashion Critics' Awards for his design work. By the mid-1970s, however, according to Herman, he was "burned out."

#### **A New Path**

Soon after Herman took home his third Coty award, the president of car rental company Avis approached him with what turned out to be a careerchanging question: Would he design



Avis' new uniforms?

"I said, 'Why would I be interested in doing uniforms?'" Herman explains. "And [Avis' president] said, "They're just panicked [at Avis]; they hate what they're wearing.'"

So the designer began sketching, and soon he was designing uniforms for airlines, including JetBlue, as well as for Federal Express, where his mostnoticed (and, at the time, most shocking) innovation was short pants for the delivery people.

How did Herman come up with the idea for walking shorts at a time when no one in business was wearing them? He talked to the people on the front lines, he insists, even though some of them initially thought it was a joke. "They thought I was some bizarre nut," he says.

When he first suggested walking shorts, Herman explains, Federal Express' head scoffed that the "worst thing in the world [was] a man with hairy legs and white socks and black shoes on." But the U.S. Postal Service was considering letting its employees wear shorts too, Herman recalls, so the Federal Express employees were allowed to go bare-legged.

Soon after those early projects, uniforms became Herman's specialty, with commissions coming from some of the best-known companies in the country, including United Airlines, Amtrak's Acela Express and McDonald's.

Herman-designed uniforms became so popular that, once again, he was launched into a new career strata. "I took it seriously and people took me seriously," he says, adding that his success is due in part to his preference for working in collaborative atmospheres. "There's something about my personality that likes working with large groups of people."

That personality trait also proved useful in one of Herman's other endeavors-helping to bring New York Fashion Week to Bryant Park. In the early 1990s, Herman would peer down on Bryant Park from his eighth-floor studio. The park reminded him of the gardens at Versailles, which in 1973 hosted a legendary unofficial competition between French and American designers that prefaced the first Paris Fashion Week. This humble Manhattanite lunch spot, he decided, would make a good setting for fashion shows—events that would showcase the Seventh Avenue-centered New York garment trade to the world.

At the time, Herman was president of the CFDA and already an influential figure in the fashion world. Along with the CFDA's executive director, Fern Mallis, Herman laid the plans for Seventh on Sixth, or what is now known as Mercedes-Benz Fashion Week. Over the course of a year, the pair gathered sponsors; recruited skeptical designers like Oscar de la Renta, Donna Karan and Ralph Lauren; and organized the pitching of two tents in Bryant Park. This was 1994, and such an event was unprecedented. Along with the tents came fashionistas, celebrities and the mediaand they remained in the park until 2010, when the event was moved to Lincoln Center. (It's expected to move again to the sprawling Hudson Yards complex, now under construction on Manhattan's far West Side.)

On top of his seminal roles in New York Fashion Week and the CFDA, Herman has spent his time mobilizing the fashion industry against breast cancer, HIV and AIDS.

He wears his moniker of "the people's designer" with pride. He loves designing uniforms and loungewear, which he's sold with great success on QVC for the past two decades. The designer also utilizes his show business background as a pitchman on the shopping network.

His most recent project, however, is a return to his specialty: Herman

has designed the elegant new uniforms for Loews Hotels & Resorts, beginning with those for the newly reopened Loews Regency Hotel on Park Avenue.

Though he promises he's "not a uniform queen," he admits that he might show up at a Loews destination to see his uniforms on the backs of doormen and other employees. He quips, "You might see me there fixing a guy's tie."

And although his name may not be splashed across displays at each and every department store across the country, he's still recognized "a lot," he says with a smile. "People say I'm cuter in person." L

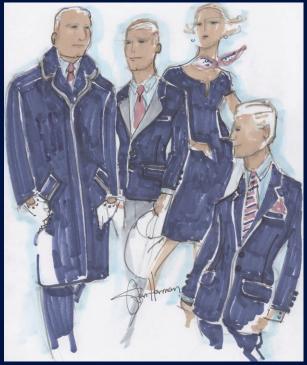
#### **Uniquely Uniform**

"Everybody thinks they're a designer," Stan Herman says. "We were working on JetBlue, and there were 200 people testing the uniform. They talk to you about how deep the pockets are, how wide the lapel is, how droopy the drawers are."

Not so, though, during the design process for the new Loews Hotels & Resorts uniforms. For the Loews Regency Hotel uniforms, he simply sat down with Jonathan Tisch, chairman of Loews Hotels & Resorts, and his wife, Lizzie, co-owner of high-end personalized shopping concept Suite 1521, for some inspiration. "Instead of the uniform, [Jonathan Tisch] asked for a wardrobe," Herman explains. "And [Lizzie Tisch] has a great deal of fashion sense—she's quite a fabulous dresser."

When Herman first drew the sketches that would eventually become the new uniforms at the Loews Regency Hotel, he had a few specific words in mind: subtle, wardrobe, texture and navy. These words reflected his guidance from the Tisches, whom Herman regarded as his two-person focus group on the project.

"Once they gave us the go-ahead on the palette color, which is extremely important, I sat down and sketched, and did a series of a couple hundred sketches to get what we wanted," Herman explains. The collaboration resulted in a collection of unique pieces, each a polished reflection of the Loews Regency Hotel's updated look.

#### The Coat

"It just looks modern and it won't go out of date. ... Basically, it's a coat you would buy in a fine store. That's what [Jonathan Tisch] wanted."

#### The Second Jacket

"A white shirt was a little too Trump, a textured shirt maybe a little too Vegas. But this is a light blue shirt. Then, the secret ingredient is, of course, what we call the Regency rose tie. The color of the tie is sort of a like a purple-y, pinky color. ... In the beginning [it was] a little tricky to get

approved, but everybody began to understand that we needed a specific color to stand out. ... The bellhops are different. Instead of having the placard of gray on their jackets, it's all piped in gray. So there is a hierarchy—the way the pockets are done, who gets a little more or a little less. It's very subtle."

#### The Jacket

"You've always seen coats that have a top collar of velvet, but this was just the opposite. We just touched the bottom of the lapel with the gray. The theme of the whole Regency itself was that lapel in gray that appears almost everywhere. But of course the biggest choice we made before we did anything was what the color should be ... and we made the choice of going to navy. We felt that the navy color was friendlier and certainly more Park Avenue than maybe SoHo or the Village."

#### **The Dress**

"[It was] probably the hardest thing to do. We just wanted to do a very simple dress. ... The beauty of that dress is the way it's cut. ... It really is a very Park Avenue dress."

# If Walls COULD TALK

History comes to life at these Loews Hotels & Resorts that blend modern hospitality with the grandeur of yesteryear.

eyond luxury, service and convenient location, some hotels have a certain something that can only be achieved by enduring the test of time. These buildings, left standing after years of weather, wear and sometimes tear, are important pieces of history and their surrounding cities. Fortunately, many of them have been restored, all the while maintaining their distinctive characters, interesting architectural details and interior design elements that tell fascinating stories of bygone eras.

Some of these structures recall authentic vintage style; some have brought together their cities' elite thinkers; some have played host to world leaders; and some weren't built to be hotels at all, but found new life and purpose with extensive renovations. The following four hotels have been part of the foundations of their communities for decades; here, we uncover their significance and just some of the history that can be found between their walls.

#### **All That Jazz**

Built in 1928 by developer Thomas Rowe and architect Henry H. Dupont, the Don CeSar Hotel on St. Pete Beach, Fla., still exudes the opulence of the Roaring '20s as the Loews Don CeSar Hotel. Nicknamed the "Pink Palace," the hotel quickly became a beachside playground for the rich and famous—and infamous—of the era: F. Scott Fitzgerald, Franklin D. Roosevelt, Babe Ruth and even Al Capone were among the notables who were known to frequent the Don.

"From day one, it was the place to go and be seen," says Jeff Abbaticchio, director of public relations at the Loews Don CeSar Hotel. "It was built to resemble the Royal Hawaiian in Waikiki Beach [Hawaii] with magnificent Mediterranean architecture and details—arched openings, clay roofing tiles, pink stucco, bell towers and imperial turrets."

The Boston Police Headquarters once hosted notorious criminals along with the city's crime fighters in the stately building on Stuart Street—a stark contrast from the elegant setting of the Loews Boston Hotel, which occupies the building today.

Two years after Rowe's sudden death in 1940, his estranged widow sold the hotel to the U.S. government, and the property was converted to an extravagant convalescent center for battlefatigued WWII airmen.

"It was a model facility," Abbaticchio continues. "Officials from around the world who were interested in developing similar facilities in their own countries came and toured it. The Army closed it in 1945 and it was reopened as a regional office for the Veterans Administration."

The office was closed in 1967, however, and afterward, the castle-like structure slowly slipped into an unimaginable state of disrepair—covered with graffiti and destined for the wrecking ball.

"The St. Pete community saved the hotel in 1972," Abbaticchio explains.

"They formed a preservation group and found a buyer who revived it." The Don was named to the National Register of Historic Places in 1974, and in 2003 it once again experienced a rebirth, becoming the Loews Don CeSar Hotel and entering another period of revitalization.

Still sporting its signature pink exterior, the hotel now has more than 277 guest rooms and suites, 11,000 square feet of spa facilities, the award-winning Maritana Grille, meeting space and more. Today, after 86 years and millions of dollars of renovations and enhancements, the Loews Don CeSar Hotel once again complements the sugary sands and turquoise waters of the Gulf with the kind of energy reminiscent of the days of Gatsby.

#### Law of the Land

Designed to look like an Italian palazzo, the Loews Boston Hotel is the picture of contemporary urban style, but the building once served a relatively utilitarian purpose. Constructed in 1924 by famed architectural firm Richie, Parsons & Taylor, the building originally housed the bustling Boston Police Headquarters. Famous cases and notorious criminals were investigated in the halls and offices of the building: the Boston Strangler who terrorized the city throughout the early 1960s, the great Brink's robbery in 1950the largest robbery of its time-and the infamous Charles Stuart, who unsuccessfully tried to cover up his wife's murder.

"The Boston police occupied this building from the mid-1920s until 1997, when they moved to Roxbury," says Lisa Tiernan, director of sales and marketing at the Loews Boston Hotel. "The building was empty for years before being remodeled as a hotel in 2003. The city police left behind a facility with an antiquated heating system, air conditioning that was limited to the computer room, and a quirky elevator."

In 2004, the building became the Jurys Boston Hotel and, in 2013, it joined Loews Hotels & Resorts as the Loews Boston Hotel. According to Tiernan, the hotel's metamorphosis involved extensive renovations including the addition of two new stories to the building, but great care was taken to preserve the historical elements of the structure.

"The addition is detailed with clean, modern lines, but with a subtle palette to complement, not compete with, the original facades," Tiernan explains. "The overall design is respectful of the original building, yet it has been updated to accommodate the new life that occupies it."

Positioned on a prominent corner in one of the nation's most historic and walkable—cities, the Loews Boston Hotel is just steps away from the 170-year-old Boston Public Garden, the first public botanical garden in the United States. The nearby Freedom Trail, a famous 2.5mile, brick-lined route, bears witness to 16 historically significant Boston attractions. The Loews Boston Hotel has 225 elegantly appointed guest rooms, a state-of-the-art gym and a brand new restaurant, Precinct Kitchen & Bar-a far cry from the holding cells and interrogation rooms that once made up the building.

#### The Return of Loews Regency

In January 2013, Loews Regency Hotel closed its doors for a yearlong hiatus to undergo a comprehensive \$100 million renovation. It reopened in January 2014, revealing a completely revamped space that

"It's still the Regency with its signature service and New York vibe, but now it's updated for this era every aspect of the hotel was updated," explains Jim McPartlin, managing director of Loews Regency Hotel. "It blends contemporary design with classic style."

The building's grand entrance hall features a lavish design and an expansive 24-foot-high ceiling. McPartlin describes the revitalized lobby as "bright and relaxing—simply breathtaking," with wall-towall white and black marble and intimate lighting fixtures that draw guests' eyes upward.

Hospitality Group, features a menu geared toward market fresh ingredients and innovative

McPartlin says. "It's a wonderful little spot to grab a croissant and a cup of coffee, and it has a separate, convenient entrance on 61st Street."

The renovation also includes the addition of the 10,000-square-foot Julien Farel Restore Salon & Spa. The celebrity hairstylist's new flagship location features 32 custom-designed hair stations, private rooms for VIP clients, anti-aging treatments and more.

"As for the exterior, the limestone facade was lovingly cleaned," McPartlin adds. "We added new landscaping, awnings and flagpoles, and we replaced the old windows with noise-reduction windows more offerings than ever."

#### A City Icon

Perfectly situated on the corner of Park Avenue and 61st Street in midtown Manhattan, the iconic Loews Regency Hotel has epitomized Park Avenue hospitality since brothers Robert and Laurence Tisch first opened its doors in the spring of 1963. Originally named the Summit, the hotel attracted immediate attention for being ahead of its time with innovations in the hospitality industry: a concierge, silent typewriters, combination barrefrigerators, bathroom telephones and stereophonic televisions.

"As a young hotel, the Regency hosted a veritable who's who of celebrities and famous people," says Jim McPartlin, managing director of Loews Regency Hotel. "Richard Burton and Liz Taylor made it their New York home during the filming and post production of 'Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?'"

During the 1970s, in the midst of New York City's financial meltdown, Robert Tisch began inviting the city's movers and shakers from both the public and private sectors to the Regency's dining room to discuss strategies to jump-start the city's recovery over breakfast.

"And so the concept of the Power Breakfast was born here at the Regency," McPartlin says. "Back then, it wasn't uncommon to see prominent businessmen and politicians like Marvin Traub, Bill Rudin or David Dinkins here. It was where great deals were made—and still is." Today's regulars include Hillary Clinton, Al Sharpton, Katie Couric, Larry King, Sofia Vergara, and other notable celebrities, financiers and politicians.

"And there's always a member of the Tisch family here, moving from one table to another, greeting guests and taking part in discussions," McPartlin adds. "So the Regency's Power Breakfast remains a signature event [and] a great opportunity to dine with the most powerful and influential professionals of our time."

Loews Regency Hotel has just undergone another milestone in its history: dramatic renovations that will further solidify the hotel's reputation as a New York City institution for another 50 years and beyond.





#### **A Landmark** Among Landmarks

Revered Washington, D.C., developer, philanthropist and art collector Marshall B. Coyne built the grand Madison Hotel in 1963, placing it in the heart of the nation's capital city. The hotel set unprecedented standards for luxury accommodations in Washington; the elegant interior caused a stir with crystal chandeliers and sophisticated furnishings. Since January 2013, the hotel has been part of Loews Hotels & Resorts, now known as the Loews Madison Hotel.

Cheraz Ecker, general manager of the Loews Madison Hotel, says that the hotel—heralded as "Washington's Correct Address"—was named after James Madison, fourth president of the United States.

"Coyne was also a history buff who held a special interest in and admiration for Madison," Ecker continues. "Washington didn't have a monument honoring Madison, so Coyne named the hotel for him, furnished the rooms with antiques from his personal collection and gave it the same high standard of luxury and service central to Montpelier, Madison's plantation estate in Virginia."

The hotel's moniker foreshadowed what would be a future filled with executive visits: Every president since John F. Kennedy excluding President

Barack Obama has been a guest of the Madison. "President John F. Kennedy was the guest of honor at the hotel's opening ceremony," Ecker says. "His presence that day was a personal endorsement and since then, countless heads of state, diplomats, business figures and celebrities have relied on the Madison for its perfect blend of D.C. class and comfort, personalized service and our attention to the unique security needs of our distinguished guests."

The hotel's long list of VIPs includes the likes of former U.S. Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, former South African President Nelson Mandela and even the Dalai Lama.

"Frank Sinatra stayed here a lot while he was being investigated for ties to organized crime, preferring a room on the second floor overlooking 15th and M streets," Ecker explains. "Someone asked him why he favored that particular room, and he smiled and replied, 'If I had to, I could jump out the window and escape.' He ordered a peanut butter and jelly sandwich and a cocktail every night before going to bed."

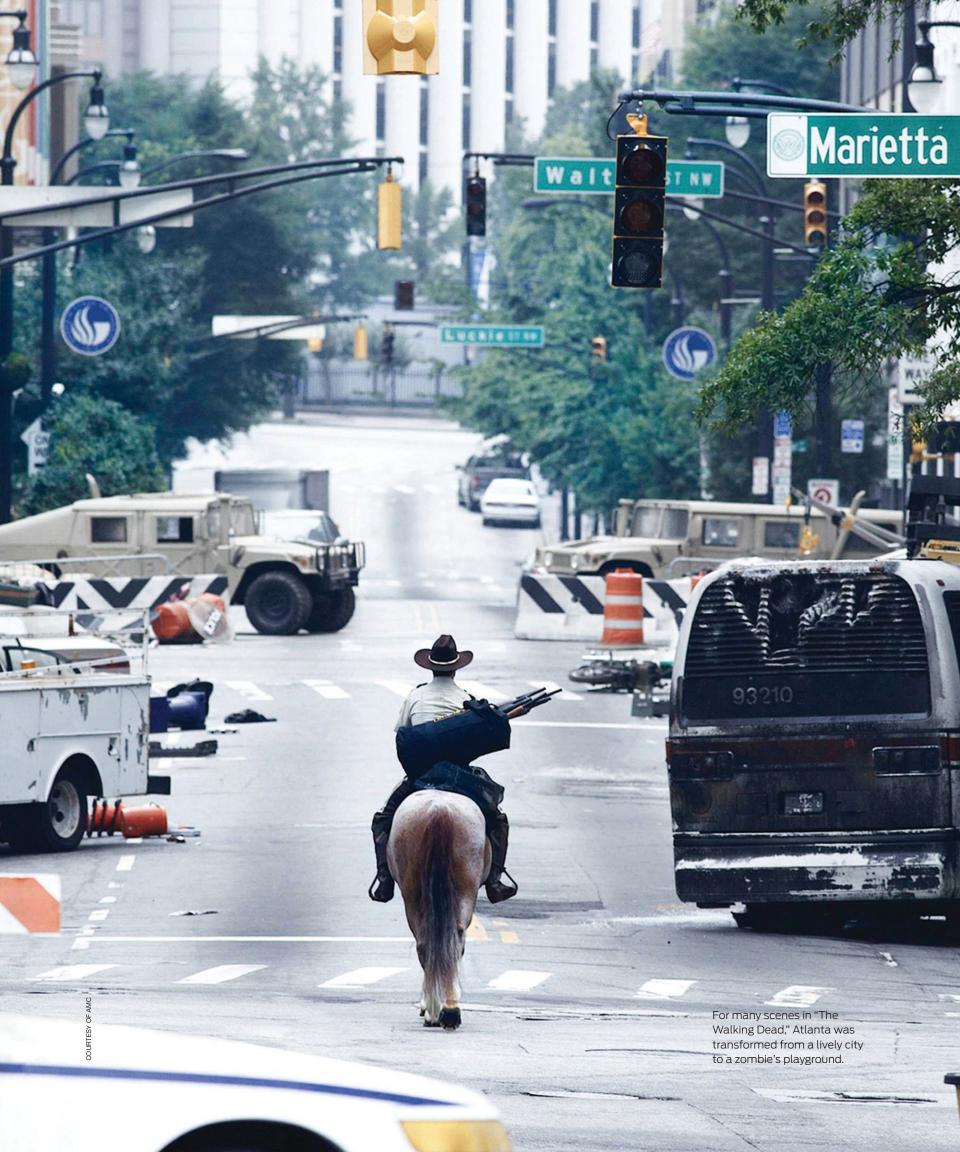

# AS SEEN ON

From the hills of Hollywood to the shores of Miami Beach, these cities are the backdrops for some of today's most popular television shows.

hink Hollywood's the only place for celebrity sightings? Think again: A new crop of North American cities is attracting production crews and, along with their programs, some A-list stars. Nashville's Riverfront Park, Atlanta's Civic Center, Miami's South Beach and New Orleans' French Quarter have all taken their turns in front of the camera in recent months, and they're only gaining industry buzz. With your favorite TV shows in mind-from "The Walking Dead" to "Nashville" and anything in between—you can experience these cities in entirely new ways while exploring the stomping grounds of some of the silver screen's most memorable characters. You just need to know where to look.

#### The Magic of New Orleans

New Orleans is known for its rich French and Creole culture, its jazz and, of course, Mardi Gras. But according to Chris Stelly, executive director of the Louisiana Office of Entertainment Industry Development, New Orleans has another quality that just can't be put into words.

"There's always that mystical draw toward the city," he says. "Filmmakers, TV producers and directors ... come down to New Orleans [for its] artistic ambience that you don't get anywhere else."

New Orleans-based shows have brought a lot of attention to the Big Easy, promoting its history, culture and people. One recent addition to the laundry list of programs that have turned the city into a set is FX Network's "American Horror Story: Coven," the third installment of the supernatural anthology that explores witchcraft in 19th-century New Orleans.

"For 'American Horror Story: Coven,' you really have a built-in background actor in the city itself," Stelly says. "It's a place where you can kind of feel these ... mythical things happening with the rich history."

The hit show gives New Orleans plenty of screen time. Shooting locations include the imposing Buckner Mansion on Jackson Avenue near the Garden District; Audubon Park, seemingly untouched by time in certain areas; and the stately Round Table Clubhouse across from Tulane University.

Other series filmed in New Orleans include the ABC Family-produced teen drama "Ravenswood," HBO crime anthology "True Detective" and the critically acclaimed "Treme," which delved into the lives of those who reside in the Treme, one of the oldest neighborhoods in the city. (The show, from Executive Producer David Simon, who also created HBO's "The Wire," aired its final season on HBO in 2013.) Head to the French Quarter and Bywater neighborhoods to hear live jazz played at some of the bars and nightclubs that were used in the series—the same sounds that have solidified this city's reputation as a dynamic character in its own right.

#### **Atlanta in Focus**

Another hot spot in the South, Atlanta, is taking a stand as a significant filming center—courtesy of an iconic game show, clever maids and a growing number of zombies.

"'The Walking Dead' is a great example of the impact of the industry; the show [films] in Atlanta as well as several other small towns outside of the city," says Lee Thomas, division director of the Georgia Department of Economic Development.

Fans of this AMC series can check out Atlanta landmarks used in the show like the Cobb Energy Performing Arts Centre, transformed into the show's Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and Grant Park, the setting for some of the most memorable scenes starring the show's undead celebrities.

Also produced in Atlanta is longrunning game show "Family Feud." For more than 20 years, the syndicated show taped in California until comedian Steve Harvey took over as host. It's now filmed at the Atlanta Civic Center in front of a live audience, and visitors and residents can be a part of tapings during spring and summer by buying tickets online (on-camera-audiences.com).

Lifetime's dramedy "Devious Maids" incorporates other city attractions like the High Museum of Art, the Atlanta Botanical Garden and the Fox Theatre, while the CW's "The Vampire Diaries" has filmed at Emory University's moody Briarcliff Campus, a building listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

"Atlanta has played an important role in the television industry," Thomas says. "[We offer] production companies an excellent selection of filming locations, an established crew base, access to world-class amenities, accessibility through the world's busiest passenger airport and much more."

#### **Music City Spotlight**

Nashville's reputation traditionally conjures up images of honky-tonks and country music stars, but Music City currently makes cameos in some of prime time's most popular front-runners. Robert Raines, executive director of the Tennessee Film, Entertainment & Music Commission, explains that the city's newly adopted role as a hub for TV production relies on a simple concept: talented people coming together and creating an environment that stimulates all forms of creativity.

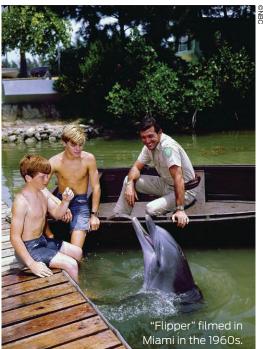
"Artists and musicians from all over the world descend on Nashville to be around others that possess similar talents," he says. "This creates a unique environment of collaboration and lifestyle that coexist with established entertainment businesses."

Music migrated onto the small screen long ago, beginning with ABC's "Grand Ole Opry" in the 1950s and continuing with CBS variety show "Hee Haw" and "The Johnny Cash Show," which aired on ABC from 1969 to 1971. Country musicians like Tim McGraw, Carrie Underwood, Taylor Swift, Faith Hill and LeAnn Rimes all crossed over from the stage to both film and TV.

In terms of recent Nashville programming, reality shows such as TNT's "Private Lives of Nashville Wives" and Bravo's "Thicker Than Water" focus on family drama, whereas A&E's "Crazy Hearts: Nashville" and Lifetime's "Chasing Nashville" showcase up-and-coming musicians who deal with fame, fortune and love while pursuing careers in the country music capital.

The biggest draw for TV fans is ABC prime-time drama "Nashville," which stars Connie Britton as a country music artist whose career is threatened by a young sensation played by Hayden Panettiere. Scout out the series' key venues, such as the Bluebird Cafe, Sky Blue Cafe and Watermark Restaurant, or explore outdoor icons like the Cheekwood Botanical Garden





and Museum of Art, Riverfront Park and the Parthenon in Centennial Park. With such diverse settings—from lively bars to gorgeous parks and residential neighborhoods—it's easy to see why Nashville is currently one of television's rising stars.

#### **By the Beach**

When the multitalented Jackie Gleason moved his variety show to Miami Beach in 1964, the area was instantly destined to be an essential part of television for its sun, sand and carefree beach culture.

"Audiences fell for 'Flipper' and 'Gentle Ben,' [both] filmed at the Miami Seaquarium and North Miami's Ivan Tors Studio," says Graham Winick, the film and event production manager for Miami Beach. "Of course, 'Miami Vice' came along in the 1980s having equally seismic affects on South Beach and the television industry itself, as [producer] Michael Mann revolutionized the look of both."

Ocean Drive between 14th and 15th streets is where Showtime's "Dexter" hunted for a victim during the series' pilot. "Dexter" fans might not recognize the popular Collins Avenue, however, since the show's fictional beach, Miramar Playa, was digitally added. Also on Collins are the homes of two characters from Starz-aired mob drama "Magic City": Meg Bannock, played by Kelly Lynch, and Ben "The Butcher" Diamond, played by Danny Huston.

Tattoo aficionados can visit the parlor from reality series "Miami Ink" on nearby Washington Avenue and 13th Street (it goes by the name Love Hate Tattoo Studio).

Upcoming shows slated to spotlight even more of Miami include HBO's "Ballers," produced by and starring Mark Wahlberg and also starring Dwayne "The Rock" Johnson, as well as FX Network's "Hoke," produced by Oscarwinning Curtis Hanson and starring Paul Giamatti. With these new series in the works, Miami is poised to remain on screens in homes across America.

#### TV's Gold Standard

The Hollywood sign looms over Los Angeles like an ever-present beacon of the entertainment industry. As one of TV's best chameleons, LA has served as a geographic stand-in for almost every other major city around the world, thanks to its ethnic diversity and variety of urban architecture.

Among the multitude of shows that have recently used LA's cityscape are CBS's "The Mentalist" and "NCIS," as well as critically acclaimed programs like HBO's "True Blood," FX Network's "Sons of Anarchy" and AMC's "Mad Men." Although set in Ohio, Fox's "Glee" is filmed at Paramount Studios and Hollywood's Helen Bernstein High School.

Philip Sokoloski, vice president of integrated communications at FilmL.A. (the official film office of the city and county of Los Angeles), says that although filming is common, there's no feasible way for tourists to make concrete plans to visit actual production sites; delays and last-minute schedule changes often occurs. He recommends researching local tour companies that include visits to popular film sites. Those looking to witness stars in action can also get tickets to a show filmed in front of a live studio audience, such as "The Big Bang Theory," filmed at Warner Bros. Studios in Burbank, or "Jimmy Kimmel Live," which tapes at the El Capitan Theatre in Hollywood.

"Downtown Los Angeles is the most commonly filmed area in Los Angeles and the place visitors are most likely to run into a film shoot," he says. "Spring [Street] and Broadway downtown are the area's go-to [places] for stand-in areas for New York, Chicago, et cetera. Los Angeles City Hall is used regularly for film production."

Another attraction that's famous in its own right, the Griffith Observatory, has frequently appeared in popular crime dramas like "Criminal Minds" on CBS and "The Closer" on TNT. Fans of Fox's "Bones" can visit the Natural History Museum at Exposition Park, whose exterior serves as the fictitious Jeffersonian Institute, the headquarters where special agent Seeley Booth, Dr. Temperance "Bones" Brennan and their team solve complex crimes each week.

#### **Book It**

Loews Vanderbilt Hotel in Nashville, Tenn., is just a short drive away from two famous locations from the popular "Nashville" TV series: the historic Bluebird Cafe and Cheekwood Botanical Garden and Museum of Art.

## LIONS AND TIGERS AND BEARS,

Discover your wild side at world-class zoos across the country.

dventurers and animal enthusiasts don't have to travel too far to rock out with a rhino or see sharks make a splash. Some of the world's most renowned zoos and animal-loving locales are closer than you thinkand the whole family can romp and roam its way through them, all while contributing to global conservation efforts. Here, we explore some of the country's top wild experiences.

#### **Zoo in Two**

The San Diego Zoo is known the world over for its breathtaking exhibits and wide-reaching efforts to help endangered animal populations. A stroll through its grounds gives you an abundance of opportunities to observe creatures in their natural habitats as well as sneak peeks at rare species. In fact, the facility is one of very few zoos in the world that's home to giant pandas, and each bear has become an international celebrity.

The zoo's exhibits, such as the recently added Conrad Prebys Australian Outback, are constantly growing and evolving, making every trip a new experience. For an especially educational and interactive trip, you can take additional tours: Purchase a Backstage Pass to get up close and personal with some of the animals, or experience the Inside Look Tour that assigns you an experienced guide to give you the inside scoop on how the zoo cares for all of its inhabitants.

The San Diego Zoo is so popular, visitors are often surprised to discover that it operates a second location called the San Diego Zoo Safari Park. Just a short drive north, the Safari Park features expansive open ranges and interactive activities like the Jungle Ropes Safari—which allows thrill-seekers to zip line across lofty rope bridges and soar over greenery (with assistance

from the zoo staff, if necessary). Back on terra firma, Lorikeet Landing provides a great photo opportunity; kids can get their pictures taken as the friendly birds enjoy snacks right out of their hands. Both the San Diego Zoo and Safari Park also host special events throughout the year, so be sure to check sandiegozoo.org for details when planning a trip.

#### Flora and Fauna

It may be known for celebrity sightings and glamorous shopping, but Los Angeles also has an untamed side—and you can find it at the Los Angeles Zoo and Botanical Gardens. Located in gorgeous Griffith Park, the Los Angeles Zoo is a one-stop destination for an entire day of sightseeing, just a stone's throw from the buzz of Hollywood. Attracting 1.6 million visitors year-round, the renowned attraction is home to 250 different species on 133 acres. zoo has a particularly strong focus on preservation and research, participating in projects that help to save and restore populations of endangered species like the golden lion tamarin, Visayan warty pig and California condor.

Visitors also have the chance to do more than just gaze at the animals. "The LA Zoo offers interactive exhibits that get the whole family involved," says Connie Morgan, president of the Greater Los Angeles Zoo Association (GLAZA), the nonprofit organization that funds the zoo. "The Indian Rhino Encounter offers a chance to feed and touch a live rhino. There's the Tom Mankiewicz Conservation Carousel and seasonal events such as Big Bunny's Spring Fling, Boo at the Zoo [and] the Reindeer Romp."

Programs created specifically for little ones, such as ZooCamp for children ages 4 to 9 and other educational classes, teach kids about nature through games, crafts, stories and live animal encounters. For kids and adults alike, the zoo's most popular sights are the LAIR (living amphibians, invertebrates and reptiles), Elephants of Asia



and Campo Gorilla Reserve. "Visitors enjoy the zoo as a wonderfully adventurous place to have a good time while learning the importance of saving and protecting wildlife," Morgan says. An eagerly anticipated Rainforest of the Americas habitat is also scheduled to open this year; the exhibit will be an immersive tropical environment.

#### **Beasts of Boston**

Over on the East Coast, Zoo New England is made up of two separate facilities on opposite ends of town: the 72-acre Franklin Park Zoo in Boston's historic Franklin Park, and the 26-acre Stone Zoo in Stoneham (9 miles north of downtown Boston). A highlight at Franklin is Breakfast with the Animals, which allows families early entry to the zoo and a continental breakfast. accompanied by a staff member who can chat with guests and answer even the wildest questions about the animals. At Stone, you can see a diverse variety of animals ranging from the lynx and arctic foxes of the Canadian woods to the Sierra Madre's Gila monsters and even friendly barnyard critters that you can interact with.

Boston's wild streak doesn't end there. For sea life encounters, take a trip to the New England Aquarium, situated on the Central Wharf. Say hello to the colony of penguins that lives on the first level of the aquarium—you'll recognize the African penguins by their loud call that sounds like a donkey's bray, rockhopper penguins by their fierce "hairdos" and blue penguins by their tiny stature. Kids will get a kick out of the open-air New Balance Foundation Marine Mammal Center, where they can watch seals, sea lions and northern fur seals at play. Marvel at the Yawkey Coral Reef Center, a seven-tank wonder that gives close-up views of eels, sea urchins and other water-dwelling



creatures. Feel your way through the Trust Family Foundation Shark and Ray Touch Tank, the largest tank of its kind on the East Coast. "You can touch a variety of species of rays and small sharks as they swim by in a beautiful lagoon setting," says Tony LaCasse, media relations director for the New England Aquarium. "Most importantly, you will learn about the urgent need for shark conservation around the world."

The aquarium's activities extend beyond its walls with the New England Aquarium Whale Watch, a program formed in partnership with Boston Harbor Cruises that takes people out on the water with an aquarium expert to witness whales and dolphins feeding and playing in the Stellwagen Bank National Marine Sanctuary. The catamarans depart from the wharf from late March through October, and tickets are available online or at the aquarium.

#### **Dive Into New Orleans**

A trip to the Audubon Aquarium of the Americas in New Orleans is not only a fun family outing but also an informative look into the region's crucial fishing industry. The new Geaux Fish exhibit is an interactive display that teaches guests about the area's seafood and its importance to Louisiana's economy. You can cast a virtual reel, visit a seafood market or even hop on a fishing boat, all inside this educational presentation.

The aquarium also offers Backstage Penguin Passes for those who want to meet, touch and learn about African penguins. Go from sea to air at Parakeet Pointe, an 800-square-foot outdoor environment where guests can feed birds and observe them in flight. The aquarium also features a Stingray Touchpool, Mississippi River Gallery and Hurricane Simulator.

The Audubon Aquarium belongs to a family of museums ideal for animal enthusiasts, collectively called the Audubon Nature Institute. The institute also features an insectarium, zoo and Imax theater.

#### **Urban Jungle**

City and nature collide at the Central Park Zoo, where you can meet creatures from the tropical rainforest against the backdrop of the Manhattan skyline. More than 150 species from around the world reside here, including red pandas, snow monkeys and poison dart frogs. The zoo's 4-D Theater offers another way for kids to connect with creatures, with sensory stimuli like water mist, bubbles, leg tickles and seat vibrations that play to imaginations as 3-D images dance onscreen.

Head north and you'll find the largest metropolitan zoo in the world: the Bronx Zoo. Among its 6,000-plus animals are lemurs and crocodiles in the Madagascar exhibit, gibbons and tapirs in JungleWorld, and gorillas in the Congo Gorilla Forest. Kids can bug out on the creepy crawly Bug Carousel or explore the Butterfly Garden. The Animal Activity Trail lets families find their inner animal with a workout that'll have kids tuckered out just in time for an afternoon nap.

Over on Coney Island, the New York Aquarium offers a glimpse of the world's oceans, with cownose rays and moray eels peeking out from a coral reef while pretty piranhas circle the underwater greenery. Here you'll also get a peek into Brazil's flooded forest and even learn about sustainability in your own home.

Ravaged by Hurricane Sandy in 2012, the aquarium saw many of its exhibits destroyed. Fortunately, the community banded together on the path to recovery and helped to reopen the aquarium just seven months later as part of an ongoing transformation toward an interactive gathering space. The aquarium recently broke ground on a new 57,000-square-foot shark exhibit slated to open in 2016.

#### America's First Zoo

The Philadelphia Zoo opened in 1874, giving it the distinction of being the first zoo in the country. Since its

opening, it's grown to house more than 1,300 animals and features an array of exhibits and special encounters like balloon rides, camel safaris, swan boats, a carousel, a lorikeet experience and a miniature railroad. See numerous endangered species including rare orangutans, spider monkeys, fruit bats, gorillas, birds and leopards.

Perhaps the most engaging animal experience available is the one-ofa-kind trail system, a campus-wide series of elevated passageways that allows monkeys, lemurs and apes to traverse outside of their normal exhibits. The Philadelphia Zoo also has architectural and landscape features that pay homage to the rich history of the area, making this a destination

for education in multiple curriculums. In addition, a facility called KidZooU was built especially with kids ages 2 to 13 in mind. The area engages young visitors by teaching them about animal care, and houses goats, sheep, ducks, butterflies, fish and more.

Whichever wild destinations they choose to explore, visitors both young and old are bound to learn something new. In the words of Jennifer Fields, a spokesperson for the Association of Zoos and Aquariums: "Hometown residents and families from out of town will meet amazing animals and discover fascinating habitats, enabling them to take away experiences and conservation messages they will remember for many years to come." L

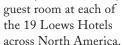

# Capital Taste

Loews Madison Hotel honors the rich culinary tradition established by chef Georges Adrien Fanjas at The Montpelier restaurant.

🚺o M. Georges Adrien Fanjas chef extraordinary—you are what you eat, and if you are royalty you eat royally," states a vintage press release dated Feb. 7, 1963.

The release served as an announcement that Fanjas, a French-born, renowned master chef, would be joining the staff at The Madison hotel as chef de cuisine. Already the talk of the town for its luxurious details and personalized service never before seen at a hotel in Washington, D.C., The Madison put the icing on the cake with the hiring of its famous new chef.

With him, chef Fanjas brought a menu of sophisticated dishes fit for the world's leading aristocrats. The hotel's

original dinner menu featured items like lamb noisettes, Maine lobster and paupiettes of Dover sole Marguery. Having worked in kitchens around the world, from Nice and New York to Stockholm and San Juan, and with the experience of serving Queen Elizabeth II on his resume, Fanjas would now have the opportunity to cook for Washington's elite at The Montpelier, the hotel's on-site restaurant.

"For a long time, I have wanted to work in the capital of the United States," Fanjas said in the release. "For this is the meeting place, the focal point, of the world's princes and statesmen the important people from all areas of human leadership who know and

appreciate the finest in cuisine.

"Your president and first lady have led the way to this return to gracious dining," he added. He was referring to John F. Kennedy and first lady Jacqueline, who were present for the official opening of the hotel in 1963.

The following 50 years brought both changes in ownership and the closing of The Montpelier, but the hotel's sterling reputation as one of the best addresses in the city remains, thanks in part to the Loews commitment to providing only the finest in dining experiences for its guests.

"Our food today has different influences than that of The Montpelier restaurant, which closed in the late '90s,"

says Zachary Dallessandro, the Loews Madison Hotel's director of food and beverage. "It is soon to be replaced with a brand new restaurant that will feature unique and authentic Argentinian dishes, wines and custom cocktails created by renowned 'Iron Chef' star Jose Garces." The new restaurant, Rural Society, is expected to open later this year.

"A central philosophy holds true we believe our culinary offerings are at the heart of our guests' experience and are equally as important and impactful as the rooms themselves," Dallessandro continues. "We want to create a unique and lasting dining experience that will have our guests wanting to come back for more." L



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
