Catalina: The Wild Side art show and sale on Oct. 26. At the event, 10 plein-air artists will

display pieces that highlight the undeveloped side of the island. Although this will be the fourth event put on by the Catalina Island Conservancy, 2014 marks its debut off the island.

"We felt we weren't getting as big an audience as our artists deserved, ... so we thought if we brought the show to [Newport], we could raise a bigger audience," explains Victoria Seaver Dean, past chair of the board of directors.

BEAUTY BUZZ

With fall well underway, beauty trends have shifted to fit the season. While some of the freshness of summer has carried over, there's a distinct edge that accompanies autumn cosmetics. We spoke with Jazmyn Combs, a makeup artist at Fashion Island's Blushington, to get her top three fall beauty trends.

Glowing skin: When it comes to your skin, Jazmyn recommends foregoing the matte look of last year and opting for a natural radiance. "The biggest issues in the [fall] are dry skin and dry lips," she explains. "So to kind of counteract that, ... I think most [people] will gear towards more glowing skin [and] use products that are meant for illuminating the skin."

A new lip statement: While a bold red lip will always be en vogue to don throughout the autumn season, Jazmyn notes that lip colors are starting to take a note from the past. "We're going to start to see almost a lavender-brown [color]—almost a '90s look," she says. "... And a lot of people are probably going to start gearing towards [lip] products with reflective properties."

A smoky eye revival: Since celebrities like Taylor Swift have popularized the "cat eye," bottom liner has become all but nonexistent. Jazmyn, however, predicts heavier eye looks this season. "A very smoky under-eye ... [is] not as high maintenance as doing a full smoky eye but you still get that 'smoldery' look," she explains. (949-640-8800; blushington.com) —B.B.

HOME COURT ADVANTAGE

With five NBA championships and 16 NBA All-Star game appearances under his belt, local superstar Kobe Bryant epitomizes success. When a knee injury left him unable to play a majority of last season, the 36-year-old explored possible ventures off the court and formed Kobe Inc., which will invest in and grow brands related to the sports industry. In late July, the City Council approved the sale of a city-owned property in west Newport for Kobe to use as his global headquarters.

"Newport Beach is a desirable location for most businesses," explains Tony Petros, a councilman who oversees the district in which Kobe Inc. will be located. "We are the home of Pimco. Hoag Hospital, many action sports companies and numerous notable financial, legal and real estate companies. Having Kobe Inc. as a local business adds to the diversity of our economic base. ... [It also] offers a local experience for connection and outreach with our youth and organized sports associations."

The 16,550-square-foot office building on Monrovia Avenue will undergo renovations and, according to Tony, may take up to 12 months to open due to construction and the sale closure. –*K.C.*

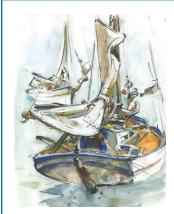


HT THE SLOPE

While you couldn't tell based on the fairly clear skies in Newport, ski and snowboard season kicks off early December. To get in the spirit, locals can watch professional skier Jess McMillan in Warren Miller Entertainment's 65th annual film "No Turning Back," which debuts at Lido Live (formerly the Lido Theatre). Born and raised on the slopes in Jackson Hole, Wyo., Jess has picked up a few notable wins along the way: In spring 2014, she was named the U.S. and World freeskiing champion. Her career has taken her to cities all over the world, including Newport Beach; she arrived here six years ago to become a Basi Pilates instructor.

"Basi is located in Newport so I studied there in their yearlong program," she explains. "... 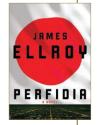

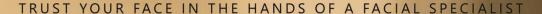
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LESSONS FROM THE PAST

Designers put menswear into perspective with pieces that look back in time.

t's said that those who forget history are doomed to repeat it, so designers have willingly opened dialogue between past and present this season—and the results are showstopping. From power suits that speak for themselves in board meetings to more casual styles that are anything but commonplace, looks in all categories are refreshed with a nod to a bygone era.

Hints of previous decades' dapper colors—burnt amber, lilac, olive green—pair seamlessly with blues and grays that go far beyond the norm. With subtle geometrics, checks and plaids energizing fall's hangers, solids are sharing the limelight to offer just the right sophisticated touch.

For some tastemakers, however, the statement comes from the silhouette. Sleek lines from midcentury men's styles shine alongside the relaxed fit of modern trends. Meanwhile, the characteristic hemlines of ankle-grazing trousers from the 1960s force a new focus downward to footwear, where anything goes, from combat boots to monk-strap oxfords.

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A PICTURE PERFECT PARTY

Find inspiration for hosting at home this fall as the holiday entertaining season kicks off.

lanning for a perfect party begins long before the first invitation is sent. Whether it's an intimate dinner or a cocktail reception, an event's success has much to do with where it's held. And one prevailing thought when it comes to party planning is that there's no better place to be a hostess than in your own home.

Residences in Newport run the gamut from palatial estates to charming one-bedroom cottages, each with their own set of benefits and challenges when it comes to hosting events. Interior designer Lindye Galloway, who owns a firm in Orange County and also has experience with event styling, believes that a home of any size can become a fun gathering place.

"I look at a couple things," she explains of getting a home ready for entertaining. "One, how do [clients] live in the space on a daily basis when it's just them; and then, how do they envision themselves in the space when they have people over."

In bigger homes, open floor plans and great rooms—which are ideal for large soirees but can feel intimidating during a quiet dinner party—can be broken up into smaller sections using strategically

arranged furniture and rugs. Tufted ottomans and poufs are versatile seating options that can easily be repositioned to accommodate guests and stored to keep a space from feeling cluttered after the party is over.



Likewise, cozier residences can take on a larger presence by creating an indoor-outdoor feel that flows from the front door to tables set up in the backyard. Color also plays a role in making a room appear larger; incorporate light and neutral colors to open up the space.

"Doing a cocktail-style [party] in a small home is probably the best solution if you're not going to have an intimate sit-down dinner," Lindye says. "... People [can] kind of move about the house and not feel like they're too crammed in one small space."

For most gatherings—large or small—Lindye explains that people naturally gravitate toward kitchens and living rooms; therefore, these spaces should be the most decorated areas. She recommends borrowing ornamental elements from throughout the home and incorporating them onto tables to accent traditional floral centerpieces. For example, acessories like stacked books, vases, candles and small sculptural pieces add visual appeal while reflecting a homeowner's everyday style.

One party essential that will also make entertaining a breeze is a stationary or rolling bar cart. A trend that's continuing to grow in popularity, bar carts allow hosts and hostesses to showcase their liquor collections or create and display signature drinks.

Once you've outfitted your home with all the basics for an

elegant get-together, hosting guests at a moment's notice should be easy—just choose a menu, select a color palette or theme, and kick off the holiday entertaining season with the first in a series of memorable events. NBM

WATER WONDERFUL

The Newport Aquatic Center is fully equipped to keep everyone propelling through the Back Bay this fall.

s summer turns to fall, Newport's Back Bay is still teeming with outrigger canoes and kayaks slicing through the gleaming waters—a scene likely created in part by the Newport Aquatic Center (NAC). Conceptualized in 1982 and opened to the public in 1987, the nonprofit boathouse is one of Newport's hidden gems, offering an outlet for anyone to come out and experience water sports like rowing, kayaking,

Its tricky location—nestled between the Dover Shores and Westcliff neighborhoods—makes it hard to believe such a large-scale facility operates so close to the water. Once you take a look around, however, it becomes clear that the calm harbor and extensive selection of watercrafts and training aids make the NAC a mecca for passionate water sport athletes and beginners alike.

stand-up paddleboarding and canoeing.

For avid paddler Kelly Thompson, the center serves as much more than a training facility; it's her second home. She began working there when she was just 17 years old and now serves as the office manager and outrigger coach. We caught up with Kelly to find out the latest the happenings at the NAC.

Newport Beach Magazine: What activities and programs does the NAC offer?

Kelly Thompson: We have adult men's and women's outrigger teams, a masters rowing team, a dragon boat team ... and then we have the junior rowing and outrigger programs for high school students who get school credit. Besides those programs, we offer kayaks and stand-up paddleboards to the public.

How many man-powered vessels are available on-site?

KT: Oh gosh—we probably have 80 kayaks, 60 stand-up paddleboards and 12 outriggers for the teams, in addition to the 315 [privately owned] boat spots in the boathouse.

What are the fitness benefits of rowing, kayaking and canoeing? Do they provide full-body workouts?

KT: It really just depends on what you're trying to get out of it. You can go out on a kayak and just hang out, but [you can also] be competitive and get a workout in. ... Rowing is definitely a full-body workout because you use your legs, core, back and arms. It looks like you are just using your arms, but once you get into the technical aspect of it, you really are using your whole body.

What are some supplemental workouts people can do at the NAC?

KT: Cardio—we do a lot of running. We do a lot of workouts in the weight room, but we try

to use our body weight more than just lifting weights [by doing] pushups, pullups and squats. ... I work with a lot of the younger kids, and my thinking is ... you need to be able to move your body weight before you can move weights.

The NAC is also an Olympic training facility. What goes on with that side?

KT: We have the German Olympic kayaking team come down every spring to train for two months or so, and the Czech Republic team does the same as well. ... We're basically the only flatwater area back here that won't get too involved with motorboats and wake, so it's perfect for K1 [kayaking] and C1 paddling.

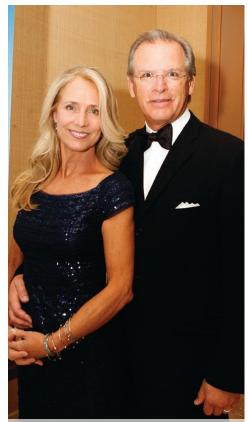

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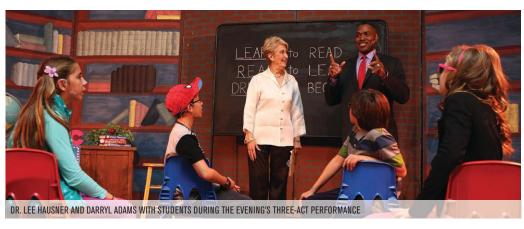


WHAT DREAMS ARE MADE OF GALA

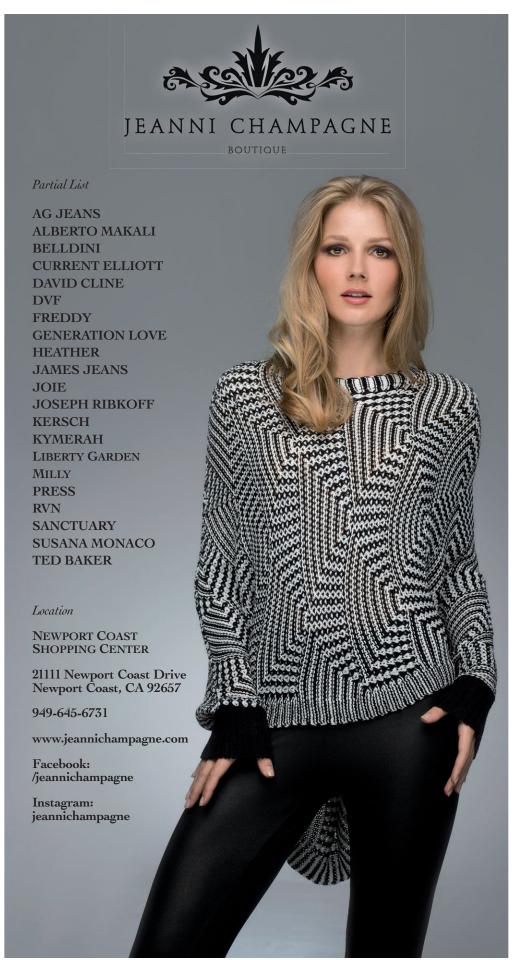

he larger-than-life stone rabbits that decorate the lawn of the Newport Beach Civic Center and Park as landscape fixtures now have some artistic company: a trio of bright green origami bear cubs, a blue dog made of steel and a tribal-inspired found metal figure, just to name a few of the eclectic sculptures that arrived this September. Part of the park's first major art installation since its opening in April 2013, these pieces, along with seven others, bring a touch of whimsy and lots of creative ambience to an already beautiful space.

The sculptures, which are strategically scattered around the green, were handpicked by the Newport Beach Arts Commission and sourced from artists across the country. Though the quirky collection is new, the commission always intended to fashion an artistic enclave in the Civic Center space, according to Robert Smith, a member of the Newport Beach Arts Commission.

"When the Civic Center was built, Peter Walker, who is the landscape architect, ... had developed a master plan for sculpture in the park," says Robert, who is also chair of the

Sculpture Exhibition Committee. "[This plan] ... called out for about 40 different locations where you could put sculpture."

With a shared goal of beautifying the space, an expert jury panel-which included Robert; OCMA Chief Curator Dan Cameron; city arts commissioners Rita Goldberg and Charles W. Ware Jr.; arts conservator Christina Varvi; and Chapman University professor emeritus and artist Richard Turner-embarked on the challenging task of gathering nominations and narrowing down the list to 10 finalists.

"What we were trying to do was make sure we had the benefit of arts professionals," Robert explains of the panel's role in the selection process. "[They] looked at the pieces and made sure they would hold up in the environment we put them in, and that they were of high [enough] quality for what we were doing."

Since the Civic Center plans were designed to draw people to the park and make their time spent there more enjoyable, it was important to the committee that each piece was carefully selected to resonate with visitors. And despite the volume of submissions-260 individual works by 171 different artists—the undertaking proved to be surprisingly easy, Robert says. Once they unanimously agreed on five pieces, the panel members chose the remaining five within an hour, in addition to mapping out specific placements shortly thereafter.

The result of their efforts is a collection that showcases a range of styles to please a discriminating audience. For example, Brandi, Curt Brill's 5-foot-tall bronze sculpture, depicts a distorted, slouching female figure that's reminiscent of a whimsical Tim Burton creation, while Jonathan Prince's Red, fashioned from Zimbabwe black granite, takes on an abstract, circular shape. The tribal-inspired Pretty Boy by David Buckingham is juxtaposed with Ray Katz's 22-foot-high Odyssey, which calls to mind images of a futuristic alien spaceship.

Despite their differences in medium, aesthetic

and background, all of the participating artists were excited to display their art in Newport Beach for similar reasons: the open-mindedness of the residents and, of course, the stunning location.

"Sharing my art with a receptive community is a very important part of the creative process," Curt says. "Having a place like Newport Beach to share the work is a wonderful way of communicating visually in an outdoor setting with a receptive community."

Likewise, artist Arny Nadler—whose painted steel work, Wintering, is part of the collection is excited for his first California exhibition.

"I'm thrilled to have this opportunity to share my work with a new audience," he shares.



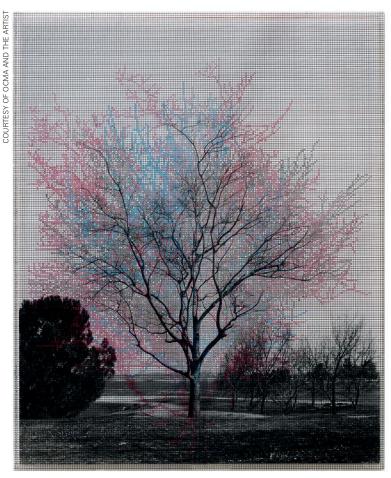

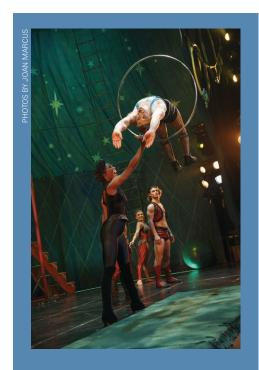

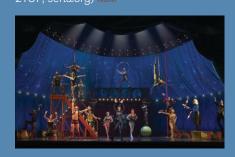

NEWPORT'S Frand Dame

Once a Hollywood siren, beloved Orange County philanthropist Kathy Thompson now dedicates her life to giving back.

athy Thompson was a vision in red as she welcomed guests into her China Cove home this past spring, dressed to the nines in a stylish gown and commanding the attention of everyone in the room. The intimate April gathering, held on behalf of Share Our Selves (SOS)—

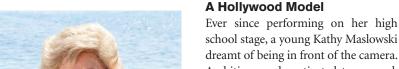
a nonprofit that assists low-income and homeless families in Orange County—served as a precursor to the main soiree that was held in May: the annual Star Team Onion Luncheon at Corona del Mar's Five Crowns, an event instituted by Kathy when she joined the organization in 1994.

While the Onion Luncheon offers a chance for supporters to applaud the organization and the groups dedicated to serving it, the pre-event cocktail reception is a time for Kathy to infuse a bit of her personality and history into her charitable endeavors. Her family abode, which she shares with her husband of 52 years, Jerry, served as the perfect backdrop for the event

and offered a peek into the private life of the Orange County philanthropist. Combining elegance with the nostalgia of classic Hollywood, the residence features framed black and white photographs of Kathy, as well as stills of her with various celebrities, including Jerry Lewis and James Garner.

The photographs are a nod to Kathy's colorful past life, one she treasures and continues to celebrate to this day. Though today she's recognized for her giving spirit and fierce dedication to helping others, the Newport resident was once known in entertainment circles as a Hollywood starlet during the 1950s and early 1960s. A career model and TV and film actress—then working under the maiden name of Marlowe—Kathy developed a charm and grace in front of the cameras that serves

her well in her present-day role. The tall, blonde vixen with an alluring persona has undergone an elegant transformation over the years, emerging today as one of the most significant figures of charity in Southern California.



dreamt of being in front of the camera. Ambitious and motivated to succeed, the Minneapolis native—who later changed her name to Kathy Marlowe—first learned her craft at a modeling school in her home state before moving to California at age 16.

"I had a sister who lived in Van Nuys who had a [5-year-old] son and she said, 'How about coming out ... with us and watching Kevin after school while I have [my own] job?' So, I went," Kathy says.

While still attending high school in Van Nuys, Kathy commuted to

Hollywood after answering a "models wanted" ad that not only landed her a job teaching at Westwood School of Modeling, but also earned led to a series of professional modeling gigs. This caught the eye of many agents and subsequently landed her a considerable number of high profile modeling titles, including Miss Chinchilla, Miss Lawnseed, Miss Long White Potato, Miss Nightmare and even Miss Green Stamps. To Kathy, it didn't matter how outrageous the title or how small the role she was offered—she was driven to increase her popularity and her career, something that was only enhanced by her statuesque presence and natural beauty. This winning combination resulted in her being named the most photographed publicity model in 1956, with an accompanying spread in Life magazine.













Gracing the Silver Screen

As her popularity grew in the modeling world, Kathy also began to segue into television and film acting with small walk-on roles, such as the science fiction classic "Rocketship X-M" starring Hugh O'Brian and Lloyd Bridges (1950), "The Big Trees" starring Kirk Douglas (1952), and "The Bounty Hunter" starring Randolph Scott and Oscar winner Ernest Borgnine (1954). Her first major film credit, however, was the 1954 Chuck Connors crime drama, "The Human Jungle," which helped her earn a Screen Actors Guild (SAG) card.

For almost 10 years, Kathy watched and worked with some of the most renowned stars of the 1950s. One notable name includes the legendary Paul Newman in "The Helen Morgan Story" (1957), who she fondly describes as "very professional, very nice ... and kinda short."

In the 1950s, she appeared in multiple episodes of the comedy series "The George Burns and Gracie Allen Show" as the loving, sultry blonde fiancee to Ronnie Burns (the real life son of George and Gracie Burns). Kathy also recalls the fascinating personality contrast between the famous husband-and-wife duo. While Gracie was

very reserved, George was the extrovert of the two.

"He was very nice to me. And he was a kid, with the cigars, the women and all that stuff," she says of George. "He had a little glint in his eye for me, too. He was a fun man, very outgoing. And, of course, [he had] a great sense of humor."

But her most memorable Hollywood experiences include two cinematic legends: Dean Martin and two-time Oscar winner Spencer Tracy.

"I had a huge black fox muff ... and I hit [Dean in the crotch] with it and he gave a goofy face," she recalls from her days on the set of the 1959 film "Career." "So he said, 'Kathy, this is the first laugh we had on this set.'

"The picture never really got off the ground," she continues. "But the way he gave that goofy cry and made the whole set laugh, it was a fond memory. He was such a fun and easygoing guy."

Her experience with Spencer occurred when he was filming the 1958 adaptation of Ernest Hemingway's "The Old Man and the Sea." While leaving the Warner Bros. Studios commissary, she saw the actor alone. Kathy walked up and introduced herself to the film legend, who was so friendly and receptive to her that he referred the actress to director Philip Dunne—known for "How Green Was My Valley" (1941) and "The Robe" (1953)—in the hopes of casting her in a supporting role in "Ten North Frederick."

Kathy's chances of appearing in the 1958 adaptation of John O'Hara's novel looked very promising, but, unfortunately, Spencer eventually passed on the project and Kathy was not cast. Regardless,

she still treasures meeting the cinematic artist, especially when he gave her permission to visit him during the film shoot of Stanley Kramer's "Inherit the Wind" (1960), where Spencer always greeted Kathy between takes.

Kathy's career reached an all-time high in 1958 when she landed her first starring role. In "The Girl with an Itch," she upped her status as the seductive blonde temptress, using her feminine wiles on-screen to con a rich, widowed rancher out of his money. Kathy enjoyed the shoot and the people who worked on the film, especially one awkward situation where co-star Robert Clark, who was not an experienced actor at the time, had to perform a drunk scene.

"He didn't really know how to act it, so he got drunk," she recalls with a laugh. "So he was in the back with the bottle. ... The director didn't think that was funny because the money was going out the window from retake after retake."

Catching a Newport Fish

Although Kathy enjoyed her life as a Hollywood starlet, she was looking at long-term goals: She wanted to be married and have a family.

The year 1960 proved to be one of momentous change for Kathy. After being approached by a representative at 20th Century Fox to fly an aircraft at the Torrance Airport for an air show, she underwent training at Van Nuys Airport to prepare for her first solo flight.

Her flight was cancelled at the last minute, but the timing was fortuitous. At a bar near the airport where Kathy was enjoying a consolation drink, a Navy captain approached her to do an independent modeling shoot on a boat in Newport Beach—it was a decision that would put her life on a different path. The captain of the boat was none other than her future husband, Jerry Thompson.

In 1962, Kathy and Jerry married and moved into their present China Cove home, which is now a glamorous two-level mansion with a rear outdoor patio built on top of 9-ton boulders that were transplanted from Catalina and meticulously placed along the coast. It was a perfect home for the

A Charitable Heart

The rest, as they say, is history. Over the years, Kathy became involved with notable nonprofits such as the National Charity League and the Las Marineras Auxiliary of Family Service, but in 1994, she truly discovered her calling as a philanthropist when she joined the volunteer team at SOS.

Founded in 1970, SOS strives to provide food, safety, and a higher quality of health care to those in Orange County who are low-income or completely destitute. As founder of the Star Team and A-Team guilds that donate time and monetary contributions (respectively), Kathy hosts the now-famous Onion Luncheons, where she gives each guest a bag of Imperial Valley sweet onions, as well as recipes of onion-based dishes that she has prepared over the years.

On May 21, 2014, the date of the 20th annual SOS Star Team Onion Luncheon, Kathy received a special plaque from founder Jean Forbath and Executive Director Karen McGlinn for her infinite energy, compassion and dedication to bringing medical, dental and financial services to the underprivileged in Newport-Mesa.

"She really is a great example of philanthropy, and it comes from [her] own heart," says SOS Director of Development Karen Francis. "For her to be dedicated to us for 20 years, it really has to be coming from her heart and her soul."

"[Kathy is] a very giving person. I've never heard her say anything bad about anybody," adds Pilar Wayne, the widow of John Wayne, who also attended the luncheon and is an active member of SOS. "Kathy is a good leader, a good speaker ... and people just love her."

As for the future, Kathy's goals are simple: to bring in more members to SOS and to expand

couple to raise their three children to adulthood.

Tony Beran, whose family has been friends with the Thompsons for more than 40 years, feels that Kathy's move to Newport Beach has changed both her and Jerry's lives dramatically and solidified their bond to an incredible level.

"Coming to Newport Beach and meeting Jerry, it put her in an environment that is basically just like a dream," Tony says. "There is such a strong link between those two. It's unbelievable."

the organization's presence to communities outside of Orange County. She continues to remain optimistic about the future of the organization, as well as appreciate the love of her family and friends—especially Jerry.

"I am very fortunate in many respects," she says. "[Jerry] has helped me through many of life's challenges and life's pleasures. Although people say he got the great catch, I think I got the great catch." NBM

International TAILE OYER

Building on the success of fashion predecessors, a new generation of global style is making its way to Orange County.

ves Saint Laurent, Halston, Burberry, Gucci. Iconic names in fashion, these brands have more than just a legendary status in common—they were among the first wave of international designers to arrive in Orange County. Beginning in the 1970s at South Coast Plaza with Saint Laurent and André Courrèges, these designers have helped our region earn a reputation as not only a premier beach community, but also a stylish destination for some of the biggest names in global fashion.

As these major labels arrived one by one in Orange County, they set a precedent for even more designers to launch collections at South Coast Plaza—Chanel, Cartier, Max Mara, Hermès and Dior in the 1990s, followed by Balenciaga, Chloé and Miu Miu in recent years.

"We are known around the world as a top quality shopping destination," explains Debra Gunn Downing, executive director of marketing at South Coast Plaza, of the role that the center has played in bringing international designers to the Southern California market.

And the global influence on our local fashion scene has continued to grow. New stores are popping up faster than you can say Dior, and the crowds at Fashion Island and South Coast Plaza can be likened to those at LAX on Christmas Eve.

But in this influx of international designers, it's not just the timeless brands coming from



Uniglo, which is headquartered in Japan, arrived at South Coast Plaza this September.

overseas—the road has been clearly paved for younger companies hoping to branch out and make a mark in the U.S. Bringing new, hip trends from around the world, companies like Topshop, Uniqlo, Frau and others are showcasing their own interpretations of international style. It's perhaps a departure from the classic haute looks that grace fashion week runways, but these new collections

arriving at South Coast Plaza, Fashion Island and around Newport offer a level of comfortable luxury that's fitting for a chic beach locale.

Outfitting a Lifestyle

Following in the footsteps of brands that capture the essence of a foreign way of life, two of the new names to the Newport fashion scene come bearing

collections that go above and beyond the signature staples. Both Topshop and Uniqlo use their distinct styles to entice a new generation of Newport consumers looking for the latest off the runway.

Hailing from London's Oxford Street, Topshop has built an empire that spans more than 100 countries. A partnership with Nordstrom recently introduced the brand to Orange County—the department store at South Coast Plaza was one of the first in the U.S. to carry the British styles. The brand, which has added a department in the Fashion Island Nordstrom location, offers petite, tall and maternity collections that have shoppers covered from a board meeting to the diving board. And with the sartorial influence of contributing designer Kate Moss, Topshop pulls characteristics from feminine, boho and edgy styles for a multidimensional, fashion-forward look.

In the same way that Topshop draws from many corners of fashion to forge ahead, Uniqlo, which moved into its first Southern California location at South Coast Plaza in early September, also pushes the boundaries of what consumers are used to seeing on the racks. Rather than presenting guests with a mixed bag of styles, the brand offers men, women and children streamlined, staple garments organized in curated collections.

Headquartered in Yamaguchi, Japan, Uniqlo's looks incorporate more than just the sleek, contemporary styles one might expect; a collaboration

with Inès de la Fressange brought the chicness of a French fashion icon to the brand. The Novak Djokovic 2014 New York performance wear line offers men's styles modeled after what the world's top-seed tennis player sports on the court. Additionally, one of the hallmarks of Uniqlo is the attention it has given to fabrics, which allow wearers to adapt seamlessly to warm or cool environments. Such textiles are featured in the Airism and Heattech collections, engineered to help the wearer maintain a comfortable body temperature, manage perspiration, minimize antibodies and eliminate static.

Both Topshop and Uniqlo bring new perspectives to fall shoppers. Revamping the perfunctory trends like knits and trousers, the British label's autumn lineup includes bold colors like mustard and cerulean, fringed hemlines, illusion sleeves, cropped sweaters and outerwear. In addition to introducing new styles and colors to its repertoire, Uniqlo boasts a slew of technological updates to the new season of style: merino wool that is machine-washable and resistant to pilling; camellia oil introduced into women's Heattech fabrics to maximize softness; and new ways to preserve measurable degrees of heat when it counts most.

The dedication that both brands show to forward movement in fashion is what best suits them for the Newport Beach scene, where shoppers are always looking for the newest styles. "Local

customers come [to South Coast Plaza] from a 100-mile radius, and international visitors [travel] from all over the globe," Debra explains of the center's draw for visitors and residents alike. "The clientele is as diverse as our retail collection."

Buying Boutique

Just as large-scale lifestyle brands like Gucci, Dior and Chloé have inspired the newer names like Uniqlo and Topshop to test Newport's waters, local boutiques with distinct fashion foci have made the same headway for their international counterparts. Imports from around the globe have made their way into the shopping centers, introducing merchandise that has become synonymous with the culture from which it derives.

One such boutique, Frau, brings the craftsmanship of Italian leather goods to Fashion Island. The Verona-based brand specializes in footwear that focuses on both form and function, and collections include utilitarian options as well as heels, loafers, brogues and other tanned products.

Based more than 10,000 miles southeast of Verona, Seafolly, a swimwear brand from Sydney, Australia, has moved into a location across the mall from the Italian retailer. The brand markets swimsuits, beachy clothing and kaftans to create vibrant looks that appeal to the youthfulness and fancy of an endless summer. Although the business comes from a different

continent, appreciating coastal fashion is a universal concept—and the chic beach consumers of Newport shopping are an integral part of the area's attraction.

"Newport encapsulates the beach lifestyle [that] ... Seafolly strives for," CEO Anthony Halas explains of the store's decision to open its first U.S. boutique at Fashion Island last October.

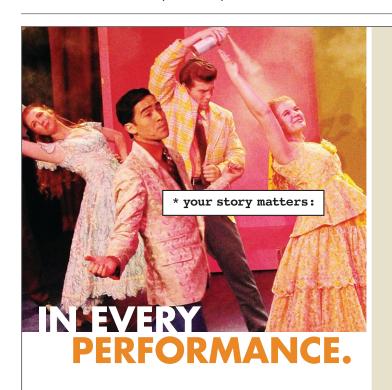
Seafolly and Frau are prime examples of the Newport retail community catering to a consumer looking for an international experience based on quality and craftsmanship; similarly, that concept also extends to specific global designer brands housed within an existing shop.

A'maree's is one such boutique, and will be host to a collection from the Swiss brand Lorenz Bach, debuting in the U.S. later this year. The looks draw inspiration from the character of Gstaad, the quaint town in which the line was designed. With pieces like thick cashmere sweaters and embellished leather jackets, the upcoming collection at A'maree's offers Newport Beach shoppers contemporary options that mix and match into chic ensembles. Abigail Rose Moreland, Lorenz Bach sales and brand developer, hints at the link between the new collection and A'maree's: giving shoppers modern, practical pieces that are crafted with a nod to a lifestyle of luxury.

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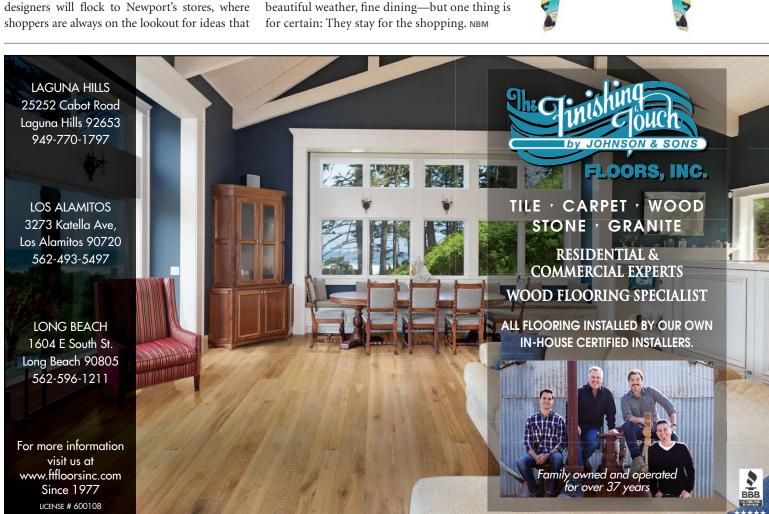

Retro Revival

Interior designers look to the past for present-day inspiration.

esigning a space can be like putting together a puzzle. Sometimes building the framework, from the edges in, determines what sizes and shapes will fit best; in other instances, the colors and textures of one section are the key to making it work. And even when you think you've got the whole thing figured out, you stumble across a piece that theoretically shouldn't fit—but then it does.

This challenge in bringing pieces together to create a cohesive space is what makes interior design so rewarding for homeowners and professionals. For many, the solution to the design puzzle can be as easy as shopping

the most up-to-date furnishings and accessories; occasionally, though, it takes that mysterious piece to make a house feel like a home.

For those who like to color outside the lines, looking to the past may be the answer—one that provides plenty of room for personalization and creativity. With moderation, understanding and patience, you can pay tribute to the past without making your home feel like a time capsule. Choose your favorite period or explore one of these four popular throwback eras re-emerging in contemporary design, and get inspired to launch your own project of decorating by the decades.







The glitzier the better when choosing 1920s-inspired decor. Look for showy chandeliers, gold-laden detailing and vintage-inspired elements to spice up a room.

Art Deco Details

The 1920s speak to a time of lavishness and kitsch collections that somehow surpassed gaudy and became glamorous. Ornate opulence defines this era, a characteristic that makes it a favorite of interior designers. To achieve a 1920s-esque home, focus on the detailing of pieces to incorporate glitz throughout an area.

"The first thing that comes to mind when I think art deco is that beautiful 1920s jewelry," says Meghan Yang, a Costa Mesa-based interior designer. You can add that style of glitzy jewelry—and similar patterns—to vintage frames that accessorize shelves or liven up walls. Meghan suggests mixing different sizes and shapes to add a depth

and complexity while reflecting the overthe-top nature of the time.

the-top nature of the time.

Continue to incorporate the feel throughout the house by using crystal hardware on cabinets and drawers, or embed Swarovski buttons into the tufting of a couch. Accent a sofa by adding luxe materials like silk or satin through with record drapes.

Azita Sadeghi, a coastal Orange County-based interior designer and real estate agent, also recommends purchasing some chandelier light fixtures for both indoor and outdoor spaces.

"It just brings on glamour, ... especially in a house that has a lot of woodwork," Azita says, suggesting Restoration Hardware's collection of crystal and glass chandeliers.

Era-appropriate chrome accessories, like a boat propeller statue or a telescope, complement what Azita refers to as the "bling" of the crystals in the chandeliers or hardware. The reflective surfaces also lend themselves to be paired

with mirrored pieces. Side tables or even a mirrored dresser are a couple of ways to accomplish this look, but Meghan says that homeowners who find this look too overwhelming can also explore lacquer to pay homage to the 1920s.

"People are getting back into painted furniture," Meghan explains. "... It can be as simple as taking an old vanity, making it teal and adding crystal handles. It's a whole new, 1920s look."

Old-Fashioned Favorites

Midcentury modern interior design in the 1950s pays homage to a post-World War II society looking to preserve rather than splurge. It incorporates easy do-it-yourself projects that give the first nod to using organic shapes. The style's real claim to fame, however, is the kitchen.

This period marked the decline of the formal dining room and the acceptance of enjoying every meal at a kitchen dinette. To replicate this in the modern home, consider a chrome dinette in a neutral color like white and beige—the subtle shades help keep a dated style contemporary. Streamlined "retro" appliances—fridges, stoves and microwaves from companies like Big Chill that take on an old-fashioned appearance but function with modern technology—can then be added in era-inspired pastel colors like aqua, red or yellow. Those who don't want a complete appliance makeover can incorporate subway tiles as a colorful backsplash.

"To make them modern, I stack them straight and do them oversized," Meghan says of the tiles. "...[If] you put in one of those fridges and the subway tiles, ... you've got an instant throwback."

Though the kitchen is recognized as the heart of the house, it's just one room—in order to have this era flourish, nostalgic details need to be sprinkled in other areas without becoming overwhelming. Smaller pieces, like circular coffee tables and sideboards in wood finishes, are easy ways to marry modern sensibility with a 1950s sentiment.

"My parents had an old icebox and we used it just as a side table—[try] something like that, that's cool and nostalgic but you can use as storage," Meghan suggests. "Or even bring in a jukebox—something that gives people a warm feeling and sets the pace for the rest of the room."

Mad About Mod

Long considered an undesirable era to look to for home inspiration, the 1960s were incorrectly interpreted to have a cold, industrial style. Meghan explains that only now are people realizing that such preconceptions aren't necessarily true. The style of modern design popular in the 1960s can be quite lush, she says, and the important aspects to focus on are color, statement pieces and lighting fixtures.

Since whites, grays and blacks are paramount in this era's look, Azita recommends softer-hued core pieces like couches and rugs in burnt orange, charcoal blue or gold to offset the harshness of the primary palette. Clean, straight lines are essential in recreating the era's style. For example, Meghan suggests pairing a low-backed black leather sofa with button tufting and pencil arms with accent pillows and a console featuring short brass legs.

"The lines are beautiful, but it needs a little frill," Meghan explains of that type of couch. "Lush pillows help avoid the harsh, hospital feel."

Juxtaposing the straight lines of a sofa with a chair boasting curved contours furthers the 1960s aesthetic-consider Wassily chairs or any furniture made or inspired by Charles and Ray Eames, two preeminent modern designers of their time.

For a final touch, look for light fixtures that focus on clean, organic shapes rather than ornate

detailing. A rigid bent base or a fluid arched iron fixture featuring a drum shade, like Z Gallerie's Spring or Enzo floor lamps, work wonderfully with this decade of design. Another option is to use a dramatic ceiling light, which Meghan employs in her own home: "We have a starburst ceiling light with brass detailing paired with a console with brass legs, ... but the furniture is really modern," she explains.

Those feeling a bit more experimental can also add more personality to a space: Meghan suggests using an animal print rug or even putting some mounted antlers in the living room as a nod to the sartorial stylings of the 1960s.

Swinging Seventies

In an effort to strip interior design of modernism's strict minimalist approach, the 1970s reintroduced personal flair back into the home. The decade's style encourages the bold and the bright, but in order to execute this within a contemporary home, you need to think loudly and implement strategically.

"For a while, people were scared [that] eclectic meant hodgepodge," Meghan explains of the era she tends to gravitate toward in her own home. "I think now people are realizing eclectic can just mean there's more texture. A lot of that creates a 1970s vibe in a cleaner, [un]cluttered way."

Furniture with a contemporary feel works well in this style, accented by 1970s-inspired pieces like Saarinen tulip or Panton chairs. Texture is best incorporated via bold prints on linen or microfiber; for a more tactile approach to texture, use a shag or grass cloth. The latter is best used in rugs, but try to also use the former on pillows, bedding and throws for the most effective homage to the decade.

For an unusual way of introducing different surfaces to the home, Azita suggests finding a faux plant divider (often used in commercial buildings) and topping it off with a tray to make it a table. This provides a real pop of earthy green color and introduces a new texture that can be mirrored in a smaller home accessory, like pillows or hanging plants.

Another approach is to employ primarily solid hues. For this, Meghan suggests using patterned wallpaper in focused accent areas, like window insets, and incorporating linen microfiber and velvet pillows on the furniture. "You're getting that textural change rather than a bunch of patterns," Meghan explains, recommending Jonathan Adler as well as Trina Turk to find wallpaper and pieces that evoke the quirks of the 1970s without going overboard. "Another thing I love to do is paint ceilings colors or wallpaper a ceiling so your eye is being drawn up there."

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KUUM REINVENTED

Reimagine your bedroom sanctuary for under \$5,000 with tips from three local experts.

ore than any other space in the home, the master bedroom should be both a stylish and welcoming retreat. When it comes time to update a home's interior decor, however, it's often overlooked in lieu of giving guest-facing areas the most dramatic refresh. Since the master is where most people actually spend the bulk of their time in the home, there's no reason why it shouldn't it be the most dreamy, chic room in your abode.

With these tips from three local tastemakers, discover how you can bring style and ingenuity to a master bedroom on a budget of \$5,000 or less.

STEP ONE: CHOOSE A STYLE

For less than \$100, paint is a fantastic, affordable and drastically effective way to begin your makeover, according to interior designer Barclay Butera. "You are hitting all the senses, all eye levels of the room

and oftentimes this will appear to be much more of an overhaul than it really is," he says. "Changing the overall feel of a bedroom, or any room for that matter, really can revolve around color choices."

Barclay, who opened his flagship showroom in Newport in 1994, explains that in a recent project, his client was looking for a light and fresh design with a subtle "beachy" feel-but one that was classic and elegant, not kitschy. He found inspiration in beach glass blues and sand shades to set the tone, and then layered in his signature mix of textures via pillows with soft stripes and patterns, followed by sheer window treatments to let the sun into the room. "Just making the move from dull gold and olive to fresh sea-blue and white brightens and changes the entire space," he

> says. "Paint is really the best way to update on a budget."

> > The designer adds that lately he's been a fan of very soft, serene shades like sand, washy blue and beach glass green tones, but for a bolder look, homeowners can opt for navy and crisp white.

On the opposite end of the spectrum, Quin Palmer from Bliss

Home & Design and Kim Rodosky of 503 Found suggest neutral hues; Quin recommends classic shades with a soft gray tone, like Benjamin Moore's Quiet Moments 1563, while Kim suggests colors in the white, tan and gold families for a clean and warm aesthetic.

STEP TWO: DECIDE WHAT TO SPLURGE ON

The three designers tend to agree that you'll likely spend the bulk of a \$5,000 budget on a bed. Barclay recommends splurging on a good mattress: "You can have all the design bells and whistles in the world, but nothing will compare with a good night's sleep," he says, adding that he'll sometimes remove the entire bed frame and replace it with a clean, upholstered one for a fresh look. "Changing

the statement piece can also drastically affect the outcome of the makeover so make that your biggest investment."

Other large pieces of furniture, like dressers and nightstands, tend to be on the more expensive side as well, so it's smart to invest in quality pieces that will last for years.

Another important aspect of a comfortable room is appropriate lighting. Chandeliers can hold a price tag of well over \$1,000, but dramatically change the feeling of a room. Quin explains that hanging fixtures can add romance and a focal point to a large space, but another good option is a nightstand lamp. The lamps should be in proportion to the bed, resting anywhere from 3 to 7 inches below a headboard.

Finally, luxury bedding is also an area that calls for higher spending during a revamp. Barclay explains that since the top of the bed is typically the first thing most people notice, it can set the tone for the whole room. After choosing an overall style, select bedding in complementary hues that accent both the colors of the walls and the furniture. When in doubt, investing in a quality white fabric is the safest route to take.

"Just getting basic white linens is a great way to create a look," Quin suggests. "... Then add a couple decorative pillows with a pop of color and interchange those throughout the years to freshen up the room."

STEP THREE: DETERMINE WHERE TO SAVE

After the larger pieces are selected, it's time to focus on the small details that bring a room together. Do-it-yourself projects—even ones as simple as replacing a lamp-shade—are perfect for bringing personal touches to a room and are almost always cheaper than purchasing a product off the shelf, Barclay says. For a recent home, he took a very plain chandelier and encrusted the entire piece in seashells before adding raffia shades; the result was an expensive look

with a much more palatable price point.

If you choose not to invest in a new bed, Kim and Quin suggest updating a headboard by either painting it—which Kim describes as a small risk with a big reward—or creating a new one by using a favorite textile adhered to a wall.

"It's definitely a different look, but it's very cool and something you can do yourself," Quin says of the DIY project.

Chic pillows, rugs and art are other possibilities that will make a big splash without dipping into a large portion of the budget. Before adorning the bedroom with accessories that span the colors of the rainbow, however, Barclay suggests creating a simple canvas with matching end tables and bedside lamps.

"Go crazy mixing patterns, pillows and other accents within this symmetrical layout and you will end up with a room with depth and interest instead of chaos," he explains. "And

whenever you feel you need a jolt of excitement, add an animal print somewhere—[it] always does the trick."

As you launch into a master bedroom revamp, remember to keep the pieces you love, ditch anything that hasn't felt quite right and allow yourself to find inspiration at any price point.

"Always give yourself permission to use a

high-low mix. You can find great lamps at a flea market and paint tired end tables a signature color you can't find off the shelf," Barclay adds. "... If you focus on the aesthetic aspects of the room—color, texture, lighting, decor—you can create a room that feels entirely new and fresh. Be creative, have fun [and] use what you love no matter what the price." NBM

Sew Much Fun

Lisa Mayer makes it her mission to spread after-school fun, one stitch at a time.

Behind the front doors lies a room inspired by French ateliers, complete with toile de Jouy fabric, Paris knickknacks, a row of sewing machines, a cutting table and colorful bolts of fabric. The space is home to Angel Threads Sewing School, which Lisa started in 1994 after realizing that education systems lack the resources for teaching children about sewing.

ing the two-hour afternoon sessions. Lisa also believes in giving her students creative freedom, so they're allowed to work independently on projects like pajamas, tote bags and dresses. Here, Lisa shares how she trains the next generation of sartorial

Since being taught the craft by her grandmother at the age of

8, Lisa has used her skills to mentor youth of all ages. The small

class sizes ensure that everyone receives individual attention dur-

savants and encourages her students to learn new skills that most traditional classrooms don't teach.

Newport Beach Magazine: What is a typical session like?

Lisa Mayer: My key thing is that I want the classes to be fun. I want the students to come here and relax. They work hard at school, so I want this to be an outlet for creativity. ... I make popcorn and

snacks for the kids, and sometimes I put on a movie such as "Frozen" or "The Parent Trap." My two dogs like to wander in, and they get attention from the students, too. People around here are very goal-oriented, and I respect that, but I want the kids to have fun.

What classes do you offer?

LM: I offer 12 classes per week, every afternoon, on a year-round basis. I try to work classes around the kids' schedules. ... I also offer adult classes a couple of times a week. My school focuses on ... traditional sewing with patterns; I'm all



about the style and the fabrics. I also offer a design class on an as-needed basis—it's a pattern-cutting class. A girlfriend of mine who is a pattern-maker teaches it, and then the pattern is brought to my class and we sew it.

What are some of your sewing school's success stories?

LM: I've had design students who want to go on to pursue careers in the fashion world. I encourage them to be realistic and even watch "Project Runway." I've had four or five students go on to Parsons The New School for Design in New York, and another student who went to Parsons [Paris] to study. ... I also had a local student who went on to start her own retail line.

What are the benefits of sewing?

LM: I grew up dyslexic and sewing helped me a lot. Sewing is very helpful for kids with a learning problem. You can't skip steps and you have to slow down when you're sewing.

What are your goals for Angel Threads Sewing School?

LM: I'd like to add another 20 students. . . . I'm always trying to grow my business, and I plan to keep doing this until I retire. I love that I can contribute to the students' growth in any way.

How has your school impacted the Newport Beach community?

LM: I think it's been very positive. I always get lovely feedback from people. I give away gift certificates to anyone who will ask and also give to fundraisers. It's a positive thing when you give back. I'm offering something that is unique [to the community], and I routinely hear, "I didn't know there is a sewing school in Newport." NBM

From DESIGN to DECOR

Style doesn't stop in the closet for homeowners who draw interior design inspiration straight from the runway.

ith fashion icons like Diane von Furstenberg, Hermès and Christian Lacroix creating textiles and accessories for the home, the line is blurring between interior design and sartorial expression. Favorite materials, prints and colors that have long had a place on the hanger are now mirrored in the textures and styles of drapes, furniture and decorations.

Whether it's a treasured statement piece that's reflected in small touches throughout a room or a bold pattern that serves as a focal point, fashion is becoming a major influence in the home. This season, take a cue from the closet and outfit your space with decor that echoes your personal style.

Assembling the Ensemble

Although there isn't one set formula for how to begin coordinating a room based on the closet, there is one goal: having a tasteful space that's an expression of the homeowner's style. To start, home furnishings designer Jonathan Adler suggests picking a favorite statement accessory from your wardrobe and drawing inspiration from the details on that piece. For one design client, his inspiration for a child's room was a collection of Prada handbags with robots appliqued on them.

"I had them framed and turned them into art," he explains. "They provided the perfect pop of luxury and irreverence."

"If a client has serious fashion investments, ... this can be a great jumping off point," adds Barclay Butera, a nationally renowned designer who has a flagship interiors showroom in Newport. "If you are madly in love with a quintessential Hermès scarf, then by all means, let's use that as the starting point for your design boards."

After finding your inspiration piece, the rest of the design can fall into place.

"Start with your color palette, decide what

elements you want to correlate with your fashion piece, then mix it up," Barclay suggests. "I did a hot apartment at the W residences in Hollywood, and that was totally inspired by 1960s rock 'n' roll fashion. There [were] velvets, animal prints, bold colors and graphic shapes."

Another strategy to launching the interior design project is to take a more collective approach in drawing inspiration from the closet. Experts suggest thinking about the entire wardrobe as a whole, looking for recurring colors and details; these will make up the basic palette for the room. Then, consider statement accessories—shoes, handbags and jewelry—for the details that will become the room's accent pieces. It can be especially helpful to designate a specific garment or small grouping of pieces that highlight the details you'd like to translate into the room.

"Keep that piece in front of you, then do a color board around it," recommends Balboa Island resident Wendy Blackband, owner of Blackband Home & Design.

To compile her boards with coordinating colors, prints and ideas, Wendy draws inspiration from magazines, photographs and websites. Using a diverse library of sources will help add dimension to the room and incorporate some variation to the initial color palette using textures, patterns and accent colors.

Make A Statement

While every room—like every outfit—needs its statement pieces, finding accents with the aesthetic and wherewithal to deserve a permanent place in the home can be a challenge.

Prints from a favorite garment or accessory are a great jumping off point for drawing attention to one area of a home.

"I would suggest focusing on one key design element in a garment or accessory that you love, ... such as color or pattern or fabric," says C. Wonder's chief product officer Wendi

Goldman. "For example, if you were inspired by the whimsical prints on our ... silk shirts, that print could easily be translated into really fun wallpaper [or] pillows."

Working extensively with the bold statement colors and patterns that appear in fashion can be overwhelming, however, so Kim Sankey, owner of Gatehouse in Costa Mesa, looks to textiles to seamlessly weave those elements into home design.

"I would find a really great fabric with lots of color to soften that [vibrant] green, purple, or orange," she says, explaining that mixing brights with neutrals helps introduce simpler themes that can be used to tie multiple rooms together. "It becomes so much softer, easier on the eyes and livable."

While exploring different hues used in runway

shows and haute couture pieces can add depth to a home and reflect personal style preferences, Barclay also warns of taking it to an extreme. "You have to be careful not to oversaturate with a theme because it can get too kitschy," he says. "Start with your color palette, decide what elements you want to correlate with the fashion piece, then mix it up. Use pillows and rugs that coordinate, toss in a chic animal print, and you won't appear too matchy."

The Next Dimension

Beyond embracing color and statement pieces, some designers suggest approaching fashion-inspired interior design by exploring the use of texture in the home.

"I think the first thing that people would assume you'd want to implement would be

C. Wonder at Fashion Island is one local store that provides customers with selections that appeal to sartorial and domestic sensibilities. "Both categories will often share similar motifs, patterns and/or color palettes," says Wendi Goldman, chief product officer for C. Wonder. "A fun example is our colorful zodiac print, which we are using in everything from jewelry to pajamas to ziptop clutches ... to coasters and candles."

Other Fashion Island and South Coast Plaza boutiques also sell both types of merchandise: Check out Trina Turk for a selection of vintage furniture and pillows, or visit Anthropologie for eclectic pieces. Whether hunting for an inspiration piece or just the right finishing touch, boutique brands are buzzing with possibilities.

color, and that may not be the case," says Nathan Fischer, of Orange County-based Stiles Fischer Interior Design.

Nathan suggests instead taking a bigger picture look at a garment and incorporating the textural elements of its style. A staple leather jacket, for example, can have layers of intricate features that go far beyond just the type of material used.

"What are the details of that piece?" Nathan asks. "The leather jacket for example—is it stitched together in a way that's unique where we can replicate that stitching on an ottoman?"

Examining the elements that may seem like minutiae—such as buttons, zippers, embroidery and beading—can also offer unexpected inspiration for incorporating different textures like wood, glass and metal into a room.

Ohara Davies-Gaetano, owner of Bliss Design Firm, explains that the contrasting surfaces are needed to make the other colors come to life even more. "It's really the same process as putting together an outfit," she says. "It's just layering and complementing."

Thankfully, getting that dimensional boost is simple with fun textures now on the radar in home design, which can be used as accents on accessories or small furnishings.

"I utilize a lot of dyed hair-on-hide—that's cowhide that's dyed a color," Ohara says, explaining that it mimics the leathers and hides that take over the fashion world every fall. "It's not something you want to use a ton of, but as an accent it creates a lot of depth and interest."

Texture might have previously been limited to the objects in the room, but extending it to the walls is a convenience that has recently become more available to designers. Traditional toile and floral-print wallpapers are no longer the only options, as modern styles and sensibilities breathe new life into the outdated interior design trend.

Natural grass cloth wallpapers speak to the earthy vibes of bohemian wardrobes, while embossed, metallic papers give extra dimension to a glamorous vision. A warm den or bedroom can be made cozier with papers that are accented with velvet, a common textile in the fashion industry. And, with more peel-and-stick options flooding the market, dealing with the permanence of paper is a concern of the past.

Although wallpaper holds a lot of real estate in a room, it's only one small piece of the puzzle. Texture and color need to come together and contribute to a home that matches the personality of

its family—and for that reason, the pieces that go into a space have to endure a critical eye and transcend passing fads.

Just like in fashion, trends in interior design come and go. But while it's easy to recycle an outdated shirt, it's a bigger undertaking to refresh a room on a whim. Incorporating a mix of neutrals, accent colors, prints and textures in a room—just as you would a wardrobe—helps a space become well rounded and achieve longevity.

And while many designers are quick to point out that outfitting a room is expectedly similar to outfitting a person, an important message lies in the difference: Home design is not about the outfit of the day, it's about an experience.

"This is where you start your day and end your day," Kim explains. "This is your home. It should make you feel good." NBM

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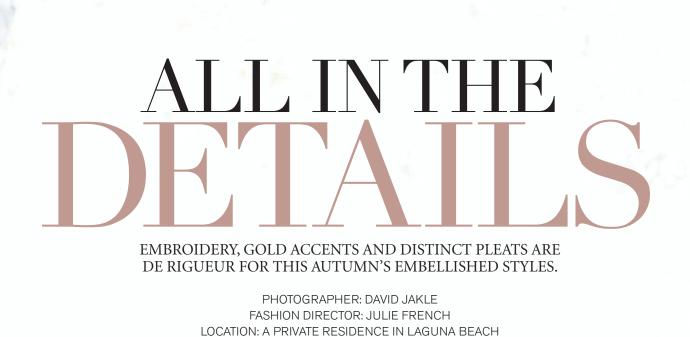
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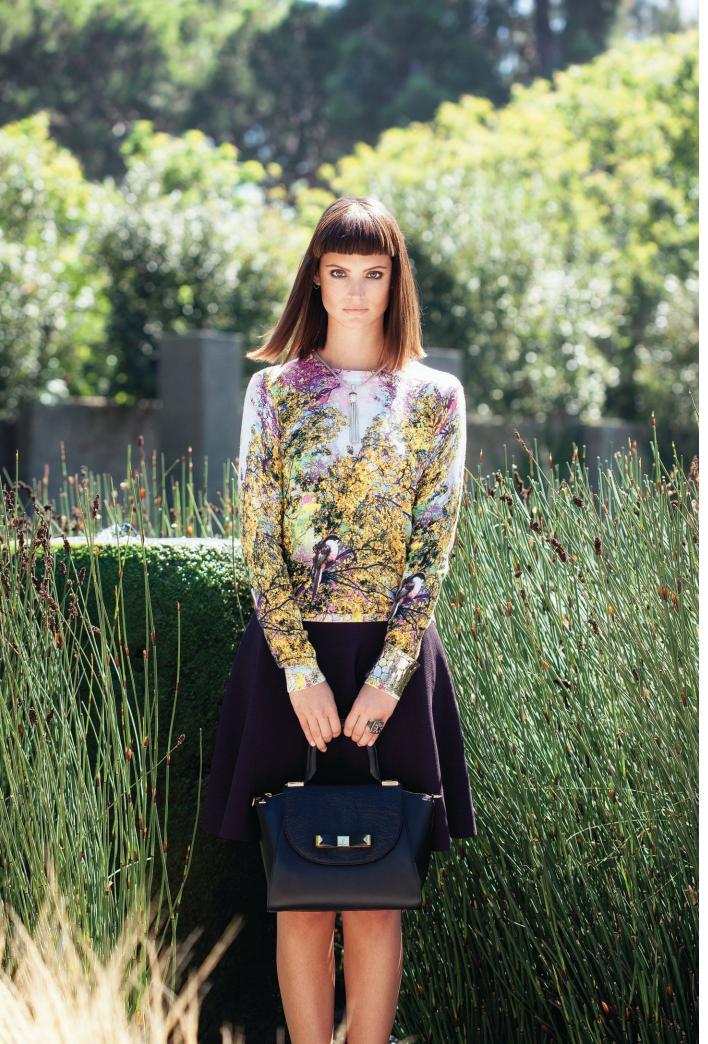
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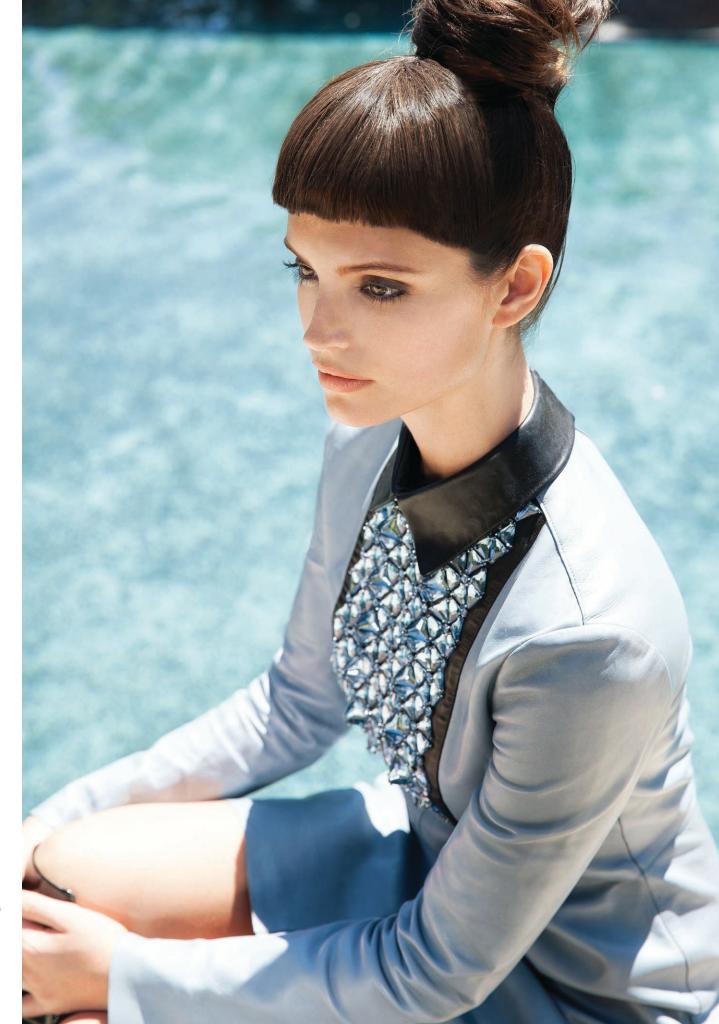

Softistale is a place either lost in or ahead of its time. Contemporary art galleries now neighbor showrooms that thrive on sales of cowboy statues. Restaurants up on the latest culinary trends sit across from quirky shops that specialize in kitty and angel merchandise. And the landscape is dotted with luxury resorts flanked by looming cactuses.

Long considered a vacation spot for those seeking a tranquil desert escape, the city's reputation is shifting thanks to an influx of stylish young jet-setters who favor late night cocktails over early bird specials. Yin and yang somehow find harmony in Scottsdale, which may be why it's become a coveted destination for couples—young and old—looking for romance, adventure, relaxation and everything in between.

Day Dates

While many couples seek solace from the heat by staying indoors at the famous resorts and spas—Scottsdale boasts one of the highest numbers of AAA Five Diamond hotels and resorts in the country—there's an impressive amount to see and do in the city that averages 314 sunny days per year.

Some of the most alluring experiences for romance-seekers lie in the arts scene. Scottsdale and the arts have been linked since the Great Depression, which brought an inflow of artists and architects who found inspiration in the desert scenery. While much of the artistic landscape still reflects Scottsdale's reputation of being "the

West's most Western town," a number of contemporary galleries are creating a city aesthetic more appealing to a new generation of travelers. Public art permeates the city, making for whimsical walks while admiring sculptures like Robert Indiana's Love and Donald Lipski's Doors, which gives observers the sensation of standing inside a giant kaleidoscope. The Scottsdale Museum of Contemporary Art is another one of the area's pioneering institutions, offering an uncommon date choice with immersive exhibitions and the famous Knight Rise "skyspace" by James Turrell.

Additionally, art and architecture enthusiasts can make the trek for a date at Taliesin West, the winter home and architectural campus of one of Scottsdale's most renowned residents, Frank Lloyd Wright. At the base of the McDowell Mountains, the attraction is open for tours and provides a stunning view of the Sonoran Desert accompanied by the romantic stories of the architect and the artistic creation that occurred on the campus—enhanced even further in the evening tours when the buildings are softly lit against the backdrop of the sunset.

Beyond art attractions, Scottsdale's natural landscape has always enchanted visitors. Sunrise hot air balloon expeditions give a unique perspective on Arizona's untamed expanse for adventurous couples—Hot Air Expeditions will even welcome you back to earth with a gourmet meal and flutes of Champagne. But for an indepth look at desert flora, wander the grounds











of Phoenix's Desert Botanical Garden just outside of Scottsdale. The scenic trails surrounded by colorful flowers and cactuses are a unique setting for a rendezvous, and the on-site restaurant, Gertrude's, is an elegant location to grab a bite and a glass of wine after exploring the grounds.

Table for Two

The recent influx of the young and trendy has also transformed Scottsdale's culinary scene. While classic, romantic dining experiences still exist in large numbers, a new generation of eateries challenges the old-guard steakhouses with fare that's unexpected in the desert-farm-fresh produce and high-quality seafood. Arizona wine is also having a moment, and many of Scottsdale's

restaurants have begun to adjust their wine lists to display local pride.

A testament to the epicurean renaissance can be found at FnB. Opened in 2009, the old town restaurant has become a local favorite with a simple menu that changes seasonally. The casual space feels like something you might find in Portland, Ore., with dishes that let ingredients speak for themselves—kale falafel, fried cauliflower, chicken meatballs and kalua pork are just a few of chef Charleen Badman's creations. With a small indoor dining room and an intimate patio that's illuminated with string lights at night, FnB was made for a laid-back lunch date or a charming stop before a night on the town. Couples can also peek into the connected Bodega Market, a fresh take on the local corner store, for local wine or other food products to take a piece of their trip home.

Diehard sushi fans who can't wait until they get back to California to share a roll may opt for dinner at Stingray Sushi. The restaurant, which boasts contemporary decor and plenty of tables for two, features Japanese sushi with Latin influences, as well as a creative cocktail menu.

For a more classic romantic setting, many couples dine at Virtù Honest Craft, a 30-seat restaurant tucked inside the boutique Bespoke Inn (which also features an artisan bicycle shop). Only about a year old, Virtù's Mediterraneaninfluenced menu, understated decor and wellstocked bar have earned it accolades, including being named one of 2013's best new restaurants

in America by Esquire. The older crowd will find satisfaction in expertly prepared dishes like the grilled asparagus prepared with candied bacon and a duck egg, and pan-seared branzino with crispy leeks; meanwhile, the younger set revels in serious cocktails prepared by dapper bartenders that are also well-versed in the art of conversation.

There are also dinner options, however, for those who want a completely nontraditional date. Every Saturday from 6:30-10:30 p.m., the Food Truck Caravan takes over a parking lot on Fifth Avenue and Goldwater Boulevard with a diverse lineup of mobile vendors. Organizer Lori Baker and her team set up both communal and private tables, as well as a Moroccan-themed tent that can be rented out for special evenings with

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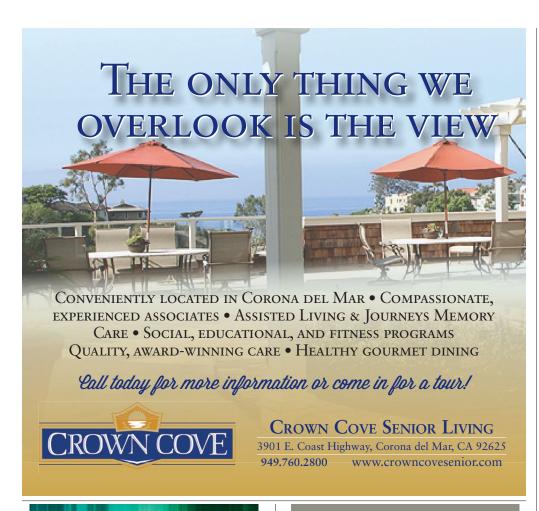

significant others or a few friends. The caravan is a lively scene with live music and a friendly foodie crowd. It's also an ideal stop before exploring the area's nightlife, considering the caravan's Ate on 5th program gives food truck diners a discount card for select businesses near the event.

When Night Falls

After dinner, Scottsdale takes on an entirely different personality as temperatures cool. The streets come to life with locals and tourists, especially on the weekends, starting with Scottsdale ArtWalk. The city's art walk is credited as being the nation's oldest, and takes place every Thursday from 7-9 p.m. The 100-plus art galleries that make their homes downtown are easily navigated on foot or via the free trolley, and the Scottsdale Gallery Association organizes special events throughout the year that bring live entertainment, like the 40th Anniversary ArtWalk taking place Oct. 23.

Fortunately for night owls, the city stays up late. Couples might prefer a watering hole with less flashing lights: Hula's Modern Tiki in nearby Phoenix is a sleek, dimly lit bar with the exotic cocktails that give the place its tiki bar categorization, but without the expected garish decor. Alternatively, AZ88 is a larger, contemporary spot that's been praised for its food as well as a bar that provides just enough cool factor for those looking to see and be seen.

For mornings after an evening out, rise early and catch a Sonoran sunrise—or, sleep in and forget the alarm altogether. The changing look and reputation of Scottsdale may have increased the amount and diversity of things to do, but the romance of the desert and the freedom to make of it what you wish remains blissfully unchanged. NBM



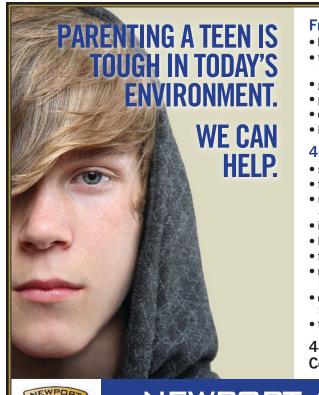
A COUPLE'S RETREAT

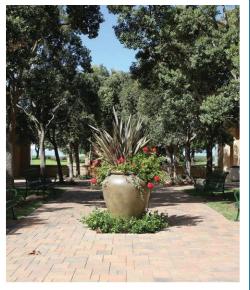
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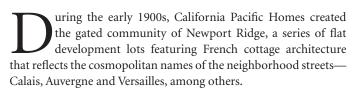












But it's the proximity to State Route 73, Newport Coast Shopping Center, Fashion Island and other key attractions that make Newport Ridge a must for young couples. Kylie McCollough, a real estate agent with Surterre Properties who has sold houses in the area since 2007, has nothing but full praises about what the neighborhood offers.

"The Newport Coast Community Center is huge," she says of the nearby recreation center. "They do music, sports [and] adult [education] classes; they have dog training and skateboarding. You can do parties there and, literally, it's less than a mile walking. It's just a great, safe community."

FRENCH COUNTRY COTTAGE

The French cottage design of the St. Michel subdivision was a perfect fit for Benn and Andrea McCallister. "It has beautiful curb appeal, [especially] the details [on the] outside," she says. "I think when you pull up, it's a perfect ... family home."

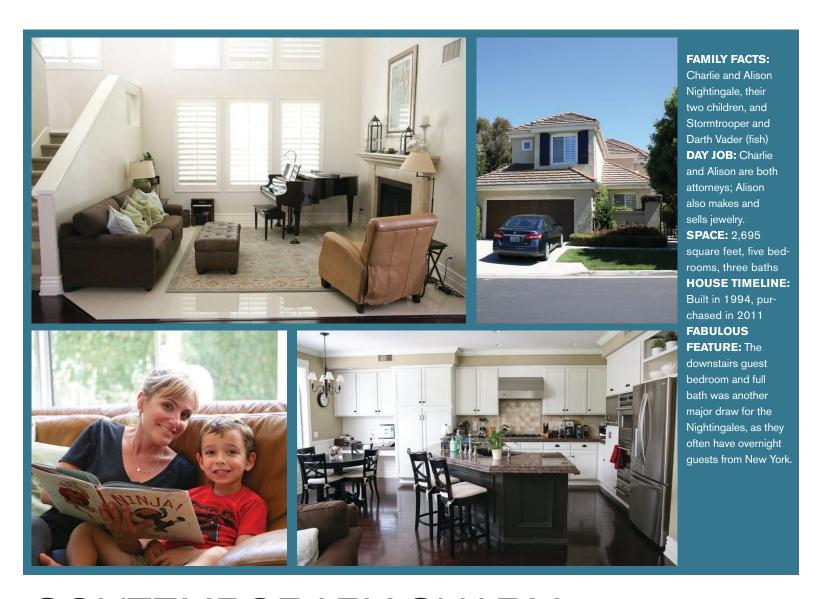
The first thing that guests see when entering the house is the high ceiling, which not only combines the living and dining rooms but also opens up the second level to the downstairs foyer. In the kitchen, the travertine floors and honeycolored cabinetry blend perfectly with white Berber carpets in the connecting family room, lending a cohesive feel to the space.

Each of the bedrooms matches the personality of its inhabitant. Four-year-old Max, a budding sailor, rests his head each night in a boat-shaped bed, surrounded by nautical flags and posters. Meanwhile, 1-year-old Cam's room features a surfer theme with posters of boards as well as sea turtle models on the walls. For the master bedroom, David and Kyle chose to combine comfort—courtesy of a high ceiling for more space—and business, as it also serves as a mini

office with its C-shaped desk right next to the bed.

The McColloughs say, without a doubt, that Newport Ridge is be where they'll purchase their own home when the time comes. It's the area's amenities—especially the spacious parks that are perfectly suited for Max, Cam and their dog—coupled with a strong sense of camaraderie that serve as the primary draw for the family.

"[Nothing] compares to the community that you have in Newport Ridge," Kylie explains. "When you see your friends at coffee in the morning, everyone knows you by your dog's name because you go to the park in the afternoon. I can't imagine living anywhere else."



CONTEMPORARY CHARM

Most of the houses in the Montserrat community of Newport Ridge are slightly larger than those in St. Michel. This difference in size was perfect for the Nightingales as they moved from New York and settled into a spacious five-bedroom contemporary estate, which is framed by two stone pillars topped with flourishing ivy. The one thing that impressed Alison the most is the expansive living room; the high ceilings reach to the second level, adding comfort and improved acoustics for when Charlie is playing the master piano.

"We like the open living space of this," Alison says. "We found that for young families, especially, the new construction kind of makes sense."

Throughout the whole ground level, each space connects to another in unusual ways. For example, the dual fireplace heats the living room on one side and the family/entertainment room on the other. Just next to the family room is a chef's dream come true: a full-service kitchen that includes a gas range, a wine fridge and two spacious ovens. Four of the five bedrooms are located upstairs; two belong to the children, connected by a shared Jack and Jill bathroom. The spare bedroom is a multipurpose office for the couple's legal work and Alison's jewelry crafting.

In terms of future renovation plans, the Nightingales plan to transform the left side of

the property, which is connected to the backyard/covered outer dining area. Toward the front of the space there will be a mini basketball court for the kids, while the back will feature a flourishing garden of trees bearing lemons, limes and tangelos.

As much as they love the space, it's the nurturing atmosphere of Newport Ridge that's been most beneficial for the Nightingales—especially the children.

"Newport Ridge is very family-oriented and I think that the neighbors that [our] kids grow up with will be lifelong friends," she says. "That kind of longevity was very attractive to us." NBM

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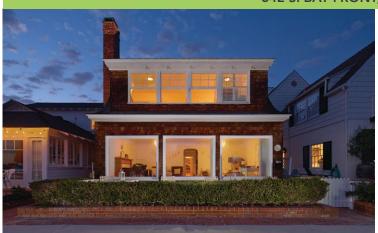
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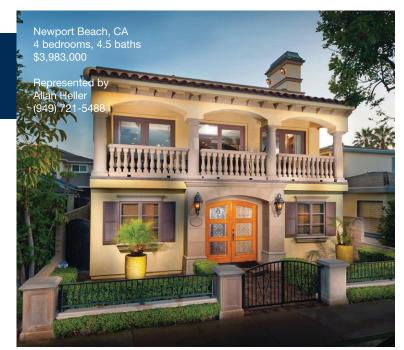

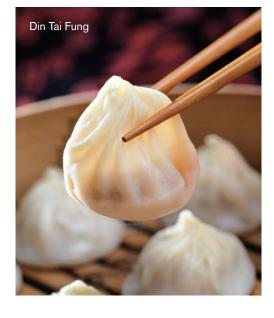
NEW TO NEWPORT

There's a new spot to try traditional Italian dishes with a California twist: At **Cucina Enoteca**, which opened in late August at Fashion Island, the menu is filled with inventive entrees like risotto tossed with fava beans, pecorino cheese and a strawberry balsamic dressing. It also has an onsite wine shop with 250 bottles that diners can take home or pop open to enjoy with their meal. (949-706-1416; cucinaenoteca.com)

Din Tai Fung has also finally opened, launching a dumpling craze in Orange County. The family-owned restaurant, which also has several overseas locations in addition to U.S. outposts in LA and Seattle, arrived at South Coast Plaza with its signature xiaolongbao in August. The Shanghai-style steamed soup dumplings are filled with a piping

hot broth and feature precisely 18 folds—no more, no less. Located in the former McDonald's space on the second floor, the restaurant serves lunch and dinner in a completely transformed space that features an exhibition kitchen for diners to view the dumpling-making process. Diners can be whisked away to France when they stop by the recently opened **Moulin Bistro-Épicerie-Café** for a baguette, croissant or other French specialty. Breakfast is served all day, or patrons can choose from charcuterie and cheese plates, light sandwiches and other family recipes from Laurent Vrignaud, who opened the bistro to bring a piece of his childhood in Paris to Newport. SUSHI SPLENDOR

A family-friendly atmosphere and an inspired menu make Blue C a new go-to sushi spot at Fashion Island.

he buzz at Blue C Sushi is palpable, from the vibrant art on the walls to the movement of the conveyor belt offering delicious dishes one after another. Head chef Joe Lee flits around the restaurant, encouraging the other chefs to break the barrier between the cooking station in the middle of the space and the booths that flank the belt to interact with diners. The comfortable energy that pervades the recently opened Fashion Island eatery comes from a laid-back atmosphere that's friendly to groups of teenagers, young families and lunchtime businesspeople alike.

The dishes that pass by the tables run the gamut of flavors, with familiar favorites and unexpectedly appetizing creations, such as the tuna BLT and vegan V8 rolls. Rather than claiming a plate right away, take a glance at the menu to discover more interesting fusions and reinterpretations of well-known classics.

Appetizers like the tuna tostada, which balances the usual fixings—tomatoes, cabbage, guacamole, peppers and onion—on a wonton

shell demonstrate the creative thought behind the menu. The white fish starter packs a punch of flavor belied by its understated title. Seared and topped with ginger, garlic, citrus soy sauce and cilantro, the savory bites are just enough to whet your appetite for what's to come.

For those looking to try something new, the ceviche roll is a savory choice that juxtaposes the different approaches to serving ocean fresh fish from the Eastern and Western hemispheres. A delicate combination of avocado, pico de gallo, cucumber and orange zest complements the shrimp and scallops for a titillating taste that recalls the seafood dish.

Equally flavorful, the live scallops come artfully arranged with the bivalves prepared two ways: one with Sriracha and cilantro, the other with garlic and ponzu, a Japanese citrus sauce. Joe is emphatic that nothing goes to waste, pointing out that the fleshy white muscle, which is only a fraction of the interior of the scallop's shell, is the only part people are used to ordering from a menu. Using the remaining meat from the scallop, he creates a mouthwatering and aromatic soup made with shitake mushrooms, garlic and white and green onions.

With soups, cooked dishes, rolls made to order, options on the moving belt and an array of sakes to pair, it's easy to overindulge at Blue C. However, it's worth the discipline to save a few bites for dessert—especially for the richness of a warm tempura brownie. Served a la mode, the sweet and salty treat offers the perfect finish to a meal.

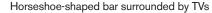
In its entirety, the menu at Blue C matches Newport's bold dining scene. "In Newport, people want something new and different," Joe explains, adding that all the plates on the belt are served in half-orders for those who aren't fully committed to adventurous eating.

This user-friendly approach to sushi demystifies the cuisine into something more approachable to newcomers while still providing quality ingredients and fresh menu options to even the most seasoned sushi lovers. Allowing your taste buds to cast a wide net and sample the range of choices is all part of the experience. NBM

COMFORT REDEFINED

Pass the plates at A&O Kitchen and Bar, where the creative fare is meant to be shared with everyone at the table.

hen Balboa Bay Resort shed its guard tower a little more than a year ago, it served as a reminder to the community that the iconic hotel and all of its facilities are open to the public. Among the amenities that visitors and members alike are invited to enjoy is the newly opened A&O Kitchen and Bar, which moved into the former Duke's Place location late last June. A completely renovated space, walls were knocked down to bring in panoramic views of the harbor for all guests, no matter where they're seated.

Unlike typical restaurant offerings, the new menu features one column of selections, without a separation of appetizers and entrees—each dish is meant to be enjoyed family-style. The ambrosia salad, for instance, is served in a large bowl that can be passed around a table of four, with plenty of spicy watermelon Jell-O, cherry tomatoes, red quinoa and feta cheese drenched in a balsamic dressing to go around. Chicken wings—a shareable bar standard—are also reinvented at A&O. The wings are plated in a ceramic dish resembling a crushed red

cup alongside an Indian raita yogurt dipping sauce to introduce a burst of contrasting flavor.

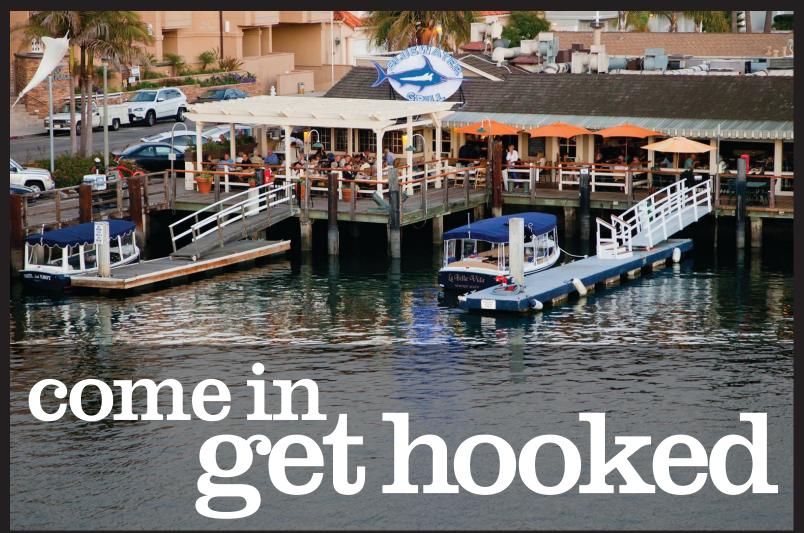
Another must-try item is the beer batter fries, described by the waitress as a refined serving of Animal-style fries from In-N-Out. Thick steak fries are piled high with cheese, bacon, sour cream, scallions and Thousand Island dressing. The larger-than-life servings continue with the Kobe burger, which is one of the few entree-sized options on the menu. Two cheddar bacon buns are slathered with a special "baconnaise" sauce and sandwich a pile of pickled onions, grilled romaine lettuce and heirloom tomatoes atop 8 ounces of juicy Kobe beef. For a smaller yet still savory dish, try the pork belly steamed buns: Three pillowy white buns are filled with crispy pork belly and topped with hoisin sauce and a kimchee vinaigrette slaw.

The restaurant's makeover extended to the cocktail list as well. Replacing the signature Duke's Cocktail, the most touted drink on the menu is now the real beer float, which comes in three crafty versions. The first, and possibly the favorite, is a

bottle of Blue Moon served in a glass with a dollop of house-made mango sorbet to complement the citrus undertones. Served in a large mug with a couple of long spoons to share, the drink can be savored one small scoop at a time or chugged in between bites of the sorbet. The other two options include a Guinness stout with salted caramel ice cream and Red Seal Ale with coconut ice cream.

In terms of the decor, A&O—an abbreviation of anchors and oceans—features subtle nautical elements, from the montage of canvas paintings that depict an anchor to the ceiling light fixtures entwined with sailing rope. Outside on the patio, two fire pits surrounded by wicker furniture separate guests from the yachts docked on the water. The gastropub also boasts an impressive horse-shoe-shaped bar framed by TVs for a true lounge experience. It's a dramatic departure from the infamous Duke's Place, but the modern eatery will no doubt gain many fans as a new generation of diners and drinkers clink glasses over a savory spread of contemporary flavors. NBM

Segerstrom Center for the Arts has long been a space for Newport Beach residents to enjoy an evening of entertainment, from plays and concerts to dance performances. Its adjacent restaurant, Leatherby's Cafe Rouge in the Renée and Henry Segerstrom Concert Hall, is just as beloved and a popular place for theater patrons to enjoy a pre-show dinner. In honor of Segerstrom's 2014-2015 Broadway season, chef Ross Pangilinan has created themed prix fixe menus to be served prior to each performance until the end of next year.

The menu for "Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas! The Musical" (available Dec. 10-14) features a first course aptly named "Welcome, Christmas." The dish is a savory butternut squash soup with delightful "gifts"—vanilla foam, cranberry tempura, star anise croutons and hazelnut soil—sprinkled throughout. The "Hold Me in Your Heart" dessert-inspired by "Kinky Boots" (Dec. 30 to Jan. 11, 2015)—is composed of panettone bread pudding, a red wine poached pear and Grand Marnier ice cream. FROM BEAN TO BAR

A handful of modern chocolate makers have raised the stakes when it comes to the classic sweet—it's no longer enough to be organic, small-batch or handcrafted. Today, the latest trend in chocolate indulgence is bean-to-bar creation. Cacao beans sourced from countries like Venezuela, Peru and Bolivia are roasted, tempered and molded into artisanal bars for consumers to enjoy. Valenza Chocolatier owner Amy Jo Pedone,

a locally celebrated chocolatier who operates out of The Hood Kitchen

in Costa Mesa, explains that taking control of the process allows chocolate makers to preserve the distinct flavors of the beans—for example, beans from regions with banana trees might adopt a fruitier taste profile, while beans from volcanic areas take on earthier notes.

While this is a big movement in the industry, there are only a few purveyors in the U.S. engaging in the practice. Locally, Blackmarket Bakery at The Camp is known for its curated selection of artisanal bean-to-bar varieties, with brands such as Dandelion Chocolate, Dick Taylor, Fruition and Ethereal sold at the Costa Mesa shop.

For those who want to tempt the palate with an array of bean-to-bar chocolates—including some hard-to-find varieties—Amy Jo hosts seasonal tasting workshops that conclude with a sampler of her signature bonbons. Upcoming workshops are scheduled for Oct. 15 and Nov. 19 at The Hood Kitchen. (949-891-1206; valenzachocolatier.com) –A.H.

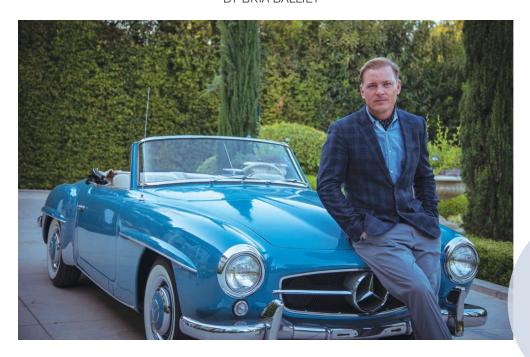

Shane Baum of Leisure Society shares his ideal day around town. BY BRIA BALLIET

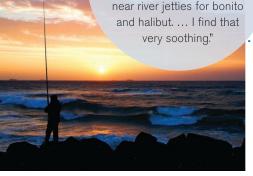
